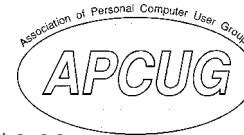
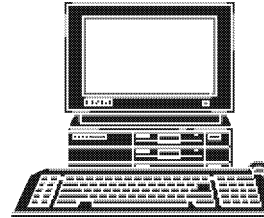

either because of time or some other reason the officers never acted on it. The idea sounded okay, but what would we design to put on the shirt. Since the officers think that there are much more creative members in the general membership than themselves, they came up with a contest (very smart). I want to make clear, this is not a fund raiser. We will be charging near-cost for the shirts.

First lets talk about what the creative member gets for coming up with the winning design. The officers figured that a free t-shirt, freshly designed and silk screened with their design would be the ideal incentive for many members to crank up the graphics packages. You will be able to proudly wear your creation and show it off to all your friends and family.

Second lets talk about the rules, regulations and contestant responsibilities. The deadline for the design is October 4, 1994. All designs will be displayed at the October meeting and voted on by the membership present. The one with the most member votes will be the winner and submitted to the t-shirt printer for production. There are both a

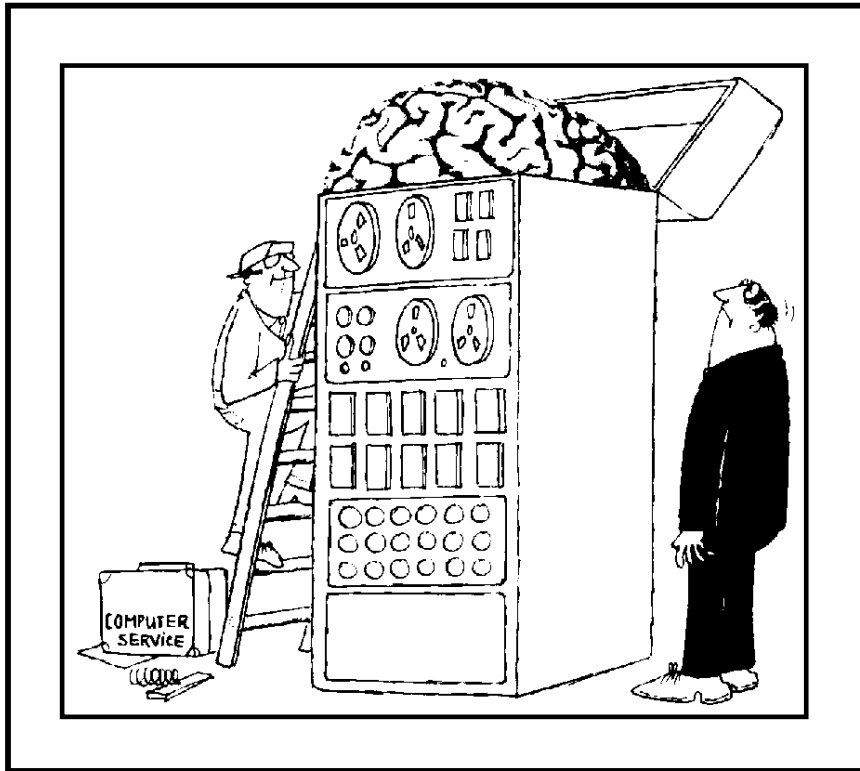
front and back to the shirt so 2 sides must be produced by the member. The front must be done all in one color, the back can be two colors. The design must include club name (Sterling Heights Computer Club), can have no shading, and must be sized no larger than 8x10. The size regulation is so the design will fit on shirts of all sizes. Keep in mind that the SHCC is a general computer club, not specific to a specific line of computers.

The winner is responsible to supply the officers with 1:1 art work. This means that printouts of the design have to be produced at actual size which can be taken to the printer for reproduction. The two color design must be printed in two printouts, one for each color so the printer can create the silk screen images.

Shirt orders will be taken at October and November meetings, and will be delivered at the December meeting (just in time for Christmas). The cost of the shirts will be \$9.00.

So get the graphic packages cranking and feel free to contact any of the officers for any additional information.

for your solution. If it is a Windows word processor, spreadsheet, or other program that requires a file load than all you have to do is substitute my file example with the file you want to load. If it is a program that does not take in a file name during startup (very unusual) or have an existing file association, this idea can still work by setting up your own file association using the Window's File Manager.

Bring up File Manager, use the **File, Associate...** menu option to bring up the Associate dialog screen. You enter in a file extension that you want associated with the Windows application executed at the end of your batch file. If the application appears in the **Associate With:** list then there is already an extension that you can use in the batch file. If the extension has an association, this program name appears at the top of the list. Otherwise you need to press the **Browse...** button and locate the Window application .EXE file. After you finish finding the program, press the **OK** button which returns you to the File Manager.

For example I can set up the ADDRESS.RAS file to be loaded into Window's NotePad

after I copy it to a backup directory in a batch file that can be executed from DOS.

```
XCOPY c:\temp\address.ras
      c:\backup\address.ras
WIN c:\temp\address.ras
```

You have to execute the batch file from outside of Windows. This means that you have to leave Windows and run the batch file. You will be back in Windows since the batch file restarts Windows, but as you can see this is not a complete Windows solution. If you execute the batch file from Windows you will get a message telling you that you are already running Windows and how you can get back. If Windows takes significant time to startup then this might be aggravating (but it works).

There may be another solution that includes recording a macro and creating a PIF file that executes that same batch file. The recorder is a Windows Accessory (applet). Please note that the PIF must have the **Close Window on Exit** check box marked on. The macro would first execute the PIF file and then execute the Window application that you want. We have not had much luck with the Window's Recorder in the past but maybe you have. This

Dear "A-T-E",

Using Windows 3.1 (and MS-DOS 5.x), I want to be able to click on an icon and have a series of tasks performed, similar to a batch (*.BAT) file in DOS. For example I'd like to copy a file or two from one directory to another, make a log entry, then launch a Windows program. I tried a .BAT file, but this takes it into DOS so it doesn't recognize the *.EXE Windows program. Can you help?

Excellent and challenging question Doug! There is a program utility written by Douglas Boling (programmer for PC Magazine) called WINCMD. This is a batch file language strictly for Windows. I have not used this product, only read about it in the June 28, 1994 issue. This is version 1.3 and I believe it has been out for over a year. You can get a copy of PC Magazine to find out how to download the utility from ZiffNet (Ziff Publishing on-line service).

We also came up with a solution that requires nothing more than DOS and Windows. This solution is not completely Windows though. You noted that you wrote a batch file that you executed, and in DOS it would not run the Windows executable. I assume that this batch file ran the file copies and made the log entry. If you run Windows with a file name as a parameter, the file associated with that name is executed. For instance

will start Windows, start Microsoft's Excel spreadsheet program, and load in the SHCC Member count spreadsheet. I am not sure what program you want to execute

More Windows tips from the Information Super Highway. There are six ways to execute DOS programs from within Windows. Please note that there may be performance issue in running DOS based applications within Windows.

1. Add an icon to launch your DOS application from the Program Manager. Select New from the Program Manager File menu, specify that you're creating a program item, supply the name you want to appear with the icon, and indicate the path and command you would normally use to execute the program.

2. Use File Manager to launch a DOS program by locating the subdirectory containing its executable file and double-clicking on the filename entry.

3. If the program has a PIF file, either one you've created or one that Windows put together during Setup, locate it and double-click on the PIF's name

in the File Manager.

4. Use the Run command on the File menu in Program Manager. When prompted you for the name of the program you want to use, type the name of your application's executable file (including its path) or the name of the PIF that launches it, and then press Enter.

5. Select the DOS prompt icon in Program Manager to get to the DOS command line, and then launch your application with the same commands you'd use outside of Windows.

6. Finally, use third-party alternatives to Program Manager, such as hDC's Power Launcher or Norton Desktop for Windows.
