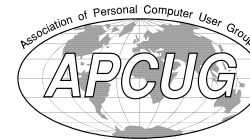

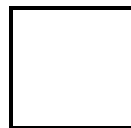

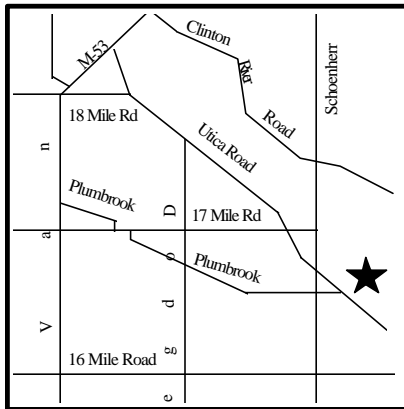

President's Bits & Bytes

Well the long anticipated wait for the second coming (or forth coming) of Windows has come and past. Did you survive Microsoft's mass marketing blitz on your brain? Is Windows 95 for everybody? I want to first say one thing, this column will not be marketing hype for Microsoft, purely one man's view of the state of operating systems in the near future. By the way, for those that called it Windows 96, pull out your heavy duty steak knives, its time to eat some crow.

One word of caution, before you load Windows 95, backup anything important. All data at a minimum, the whole hard drive if you have a tape backup. Now that we have that out of the way, on to the rest of my opinion.

Windows 95 is a good operating system. This column was written using a beta of Microsoft Word 7.0 for Windows 95, on a beta of Windows 95 (neither officially released at the time). The OS is solid, but I will say, still had some weird quirks to be ironed out. For instance, my Gateway 2000 486/66 with an ATI Wonder video card, the monitor flickers to the

point of being unusable in 800x600 resolution, which is my favorite on a 15 inch monitor. I am forced to work on 1024x768 until this problem can be resolved and I deal with the eye strain. There are a couple of Word documents that will print fine under Windows for Workgroups v3.11 that cause a printer memory overflow on my LaserJet 4P (in Word 6.0 as well). Disk access seems slower, but this might be because I am running Stacker and the backward compatibility will be slower than the native new file system. I will be giving the new DriveSpace a chance once I get the gold release.

My favorite part of Win95 and the reason I made the big switch last March was the ability to run more applications. Win 95 has a much better memory manager and handles resources much better so you don't get the very annoying "Insufficient Memory" messages as quickly or as often. The interface took some time to get use to, but I like it. The new shortcuts are very cool. They allow you to have documents, databases, spreadsheets, anything,

directly on the desktop. A couple clicks and the associated application is executed and the object is loaded, ready to go. You can even have an Internet site on the desktop, double click and the connection is made and your surfing the net.

To insure the product was as bug free as it could, Microsoft distributed the widest beta ever in software history. There were nearly 400,000 copies of Windows 95 released in a Preview Edition early last spring. There were tens of thousands using this OS for nearly a year before that. Microsoft did more testing on this product than any other product on your desktop today. Does this mean it is perfect? No way! There is no perfect software on the market today, not even the stuff I write (I know you find this hard to believe <grin>). Applications are becoming very feature rich and extremely sophisticated. This complexity will increase the chances for problems. It is truly amazing that any software product runs as flawlessly as most do on over 100 million pieces of hardware from different manufacturers with different combinations of configurations. Never use a x.0 release (first new major release) if you want

perfection, especially if it is a 1.0 release.

Microsoft has acknowledged that some apps do not work with Windows 95. Funny that many are some of their biggest competitors. I will not get into the religious argument that this raises, we will let the government work this out. I only found one application, Family Tree Maker for Windows, that had problems. This app will not run properly if the Taskbar is on screen. If I hide the taskbar and the app runs fine. FoxPro for Windows 2.6a (from Microsoft) also has a few cosmetic problems as well. The rest seem fine. If you have mission critical applications, I would call the vendor and see what the status is with Windows 95 before upgrading.

The big question is "How many copies of Windows 95 will be sold, and who will be buying them?". I think the lines will be drawn in Corporate America Vs the home market. Many companies are making decisions today on how their computer dollars are spent. Many have made huge investments in Windows 3.1x and see new training, upgrade costs, and support issues with Windows 95 being rolled out

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to the masses. There are some
companies committed to Win
95 already, but most are taking
a wait and see attitude to see
how things shake out in 6
months to a year. If you are
using Windows at work today
and work for a large
organization, don't expect to
see any changes very soon.
The home market on the other
hand will be upgrade more
quickly. There have been
many surveys that show that
more Pentium based machines
are sold for home office and
hobbyist today than sold for
corporations. It is also easier
for one person to upgrade their
machine than corporations.
This is where Bill Gates will
get rich in the next 6 months,
then Corporate America will
catch up and make the
conversion to a 32-bit
operating system. Please note
I did not say Win 95.

Are 32-bit apps faster and
more powerful than 16-bit
apps? Theoretically they
should be, but reality may be
different. First of all, the 16-
bit (Win16 or Windows 3.1x)
apps should run fine under
Windows 95. Developers
have been refining these apps
for years now. The 32-bit
apps designed for Windows 95
should take advantage of the
32-bit environment more
effectively. Will software
manufacturers get it right the

first time? Many will, many
will not. It takes time for
developers to learn new ways
of development, which 32-bit
development is. They have to
learn how to optimize the apps
for the new operating
environment. These
applications also have a new
certification process created
by Microsoft so that
companies can get the
Windows 95 logo on the box.
This logo will mean
everything for marketing new
versions of software to run on
Win 95. To get the logo, the
new Windows 95 apps need to
also run on *Windows/NT
Workstation v3.51*. Therefore
the apps have to be tested on
two operating system, not just
one. Twice the time for
testing leads to longer release
schedules as well.

Since the certification requires
that applications run on
Windows NT Workstation
v3.51, the big issue with this
OS will be diminishing, which
is a lack of native applications.
Windows NT is a far superior
OS than Windows 95, and is
fully 32-bit, and does not rely
on DOS at all. This is the 32-
bit OS that I feel Corporate
America will jump to in a
year. By then Win/NT will
have the interface shell of Win
95 and more horsepower. The
current version of Win/NT has
a stronger minimum system

requirement than Win 95, but if machines need to be upgraded for Win 95, they will buy machines that will support Win/NT. This is the real reason Microsoft has created Win 95, it is a stepping stone to making Windows/NT successful, and at the same time providing customers with a much need upgrade to Windows v3.11 and DOS.

So what are the system requirements? Microsoft claims that a 80386DX (sorry SX owners) with 4MGs of RAM. I say get real. That configuration will make Windows 95 crawl, you will be screaming for mercy. If you have a 386, stick with Windows 3.11 until you upgrade to a new machine. I have read that a 486/66 is the acceptable minimum with 8MGs of RAM. I think the 486/33 will get by. If you cannot afford more processor, get more RAM if it is in the budget limits and give it a try on a 386 (backup the drive first please so you can restore it later). More memory will provide better performance. I also feel that a 200MG hard drive is the lowest possible with new applications taking up more and more drive space. The more acceptable size would be 500MG or bigger.

Where does this leave IBM's OS/2 Warp? Well most analysts will say it is dead. Most OS/2 users and technogeeks will say it is way superior than Windows 95 and Windows/NT. You can see for yourself since IBM's Steve Woodbury is stopping in this month to show the SHCC their latest version of OS/2 Warp Connect. Where is the Corel for Windows 95 presentation I promised last June? Well, Corel does not see the benefit to making individual user group presentations any more and bailed out of our scheduled September demo. Fortunately IBM wanted to stem the tide of Windows 95 and was more than happy to come in and show their version of a 32-bit OS. They will have lots of give-aways as well. Come and make a comparison to what you saw

I am very interested in what the members think on the OS wars between Microsoft and IBM (except for Don and Jerry which I have debated this issue many times). Email me with your thoughts or drop me a snail mail note at our PO Box.

It is time to re-elect our officers. Here is the process, the jobs, and responsibilities:

The nomination process is fairly simple. You can nominate yourself or have another person nominate you for one or more of the offices. All the offices (president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer) are elected for a one year term starting in January and completing in December. Nominations are taken in October and just before the elections in November. You must be a member to be nominated.

The elections are held at the regular meeting closest to November 1st, as stated in our constitution. This year the elections will be on November 7, 1995. The easy way to

remember this is that we hold our elections on the same night as the local and national elections are held. Only members of the SHCC can vote. Ballots will be handed out at the sign-in door. The elections are held during the business portion of the meeting. The person with the majority of the vote in each office is the winner. The jobs of each office are flexible. Some are defined, some change from office to office depending on the officers capabilities and availability.

In reality the president makes sure the meeting topics are set, the speakers are prepared, writes thank you notes to presenters and door prize contributors, runs the regular club and officer meetings, publishes the minutes to the officer meetings, takes phone calls from potential members and sends information to them, audits the monthly treasurer report and membership databases, tracks door prizes, and handles most of the publicity issues for the club. TECHNICAL BITS AND SUCH

Windows Tips

Since Windows 95 is official released, we decided to help out with the launch by adding in a few tips for this exciting new operating system.

Tip-of-the-Day

The first tip is to use the Welcome screen in Windows 95 to present it's Tip of the Day each time you start up Windows 95. Some people might be familiar with other Microsoft products such as Word or Excel and how they present a new tip each time the package is started. The Welcome screen provides some very useful information in using and configuring Windows 95. They do repeat once and a while and eventually you will read every tip (they are limited). Once you get the hang of Windows 95 or get sick of the same tips you can turn off this feature by clicking on the checkbox in the lower left-hand corner that reads "Show this Welcome Screen next time you start Windows". I found many of these tips helpful as I started

to use the new OS. If you don't want to use the Welcome screen, you can still access the tips by starting Win95 Help on the Start Menu. Some of the tips are even humorous, like don't go swimming for an hour after you have eaten (even Microsoft techwriters have a sense of humor).

TaskBar Moves and Expands!

The new taskbar in Windows 95 displays the different tasks that are running as well as the new Start Menu for executing application. This menu from the bottom of the screen may seem uncomfortable to many people who have been used to pulling menus down from the top. Have no fear, the taskbar is "draggable" like many of the desktop functions. You can drag and dock the taskbar to any side of the screen. If you decide to run a million tasks and the taskbar gets filled up and each application is shrunk to a super small icon, you can widen the taskbar just



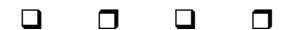
makes sure that the different coordinators are appointed and do their jobs. The president enforces the constitution and Club's policies. The president also does whatever things cannot be done by anyone else. The big key to this job is delegation. The more the president delegates the less there is to do.

The Vice President has the catch all job. So far to date the vice-president has not had to step in for the president, and there have not been any state funerals that they have had to attend. This is an important job. They person must be flexible and be prepared to run the regular and officer meetings if the president cannot attend. This officer usually picks up a project or two during the year to lift the burden from other officers.

The secretary maintains the membership database which is tracked in PC-File. They also puts together "New Member Packets" and gives them to newly joined members, and members who renew. These packets are already printed, some assembly required! They track "New Member Beast" forms to be given to members who referred a newly joined member to the SHCC. The secretary audits the

treasurer report to make sure that the membership money collected matches the membership counts in the database, print the mailing labels for WYSIWYG mailing and several reports such as a membership list and attendance sheet. Copies are made for all officers as needed. The secretary makes sure that sign-in table materials needed at each regular meeting are there before the meeting, and before people start showing up. The treasurer maintains all the money taken in and paid out from the Club's checking account. The SHCC currently uses Quicken to track the funds and generate reports for the officers. The treasurer also audits the membership counts. The treasurer makes reports to the officers at the officers meeting and four times a year to the Club's membership. All the receipts are collected and maintained by the treasurer.

All the officers attend the officer meeting that takes place on the second Tuesday of the month. Starts at
