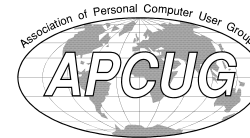

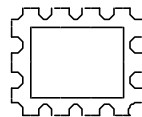

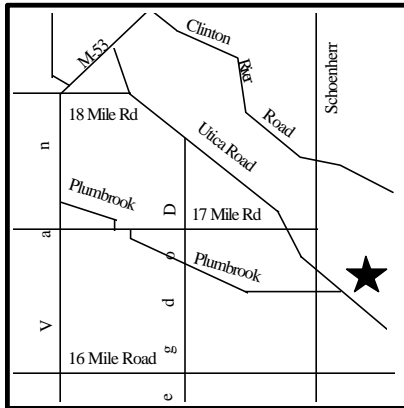

The following column is my annual State of the SHCC write-up. This gives me a chance to thank some individuals who have helped out in the last year, reflect on some of the accomplishments, and hopefully chart out a few ideas I have for 1996.

Membership

Overall the club is doing well. We are 95 members strong and have an average of 60 or so people for our meetings. This is pretty good, but slightly disappointing considering it is down from a year ago. I think there are several reasons for this. One is that we moved our meetings around in 1994 so much that people don't know where to find us. We also raised our dues to cover the cost of the room rental at the Carpathia Club. How can we correct this? The first thing is to do a better job of advertising. We will continue to have flyers at the local stores if members volunteer to make regular drop-offs. We are also considering a home page on the Internet where people can get information on the SHCC. This is exciting technology for those on-line. The best form of advertisement is you. Let

your friends know about the club and the things you have learned or experienced. I think that most members are members because a friend introduced them to the organization. Keep up the good referrals. I would like to see our membership up to 120 by the end of 1996.

Presentations

We had some pretty exciting meetings during the year. Microsoft started out our year with a sneak preview of *Windows 95*. A record 96 people attended this meeting. We also had Delrina present *WinFax Pro*, Novell showed *PerfectOffice*, Broderbund came in to show *PrintShop* (and many other packages), and IBM demonstrated *OS/2 Warp*. Thanks to members Don VanSyckel, Craig Hibbard, Jerry Carson, Rick Kucejko, and myself for the "member presentations". I think the variety was good and the quality of presenters was excellent. What is in store for 1996? The year is starting out with a couple presentations by yours truly. I will be presenting "Database Uses" in January and Microsoft's *PowerPoint* in February. I am hoping to schedule an outside

speaker on investment tracking software for March. Member Gail Minnick has volunteered to present Paradox for Windows (5.5 or 7.0) in April. Overall we are still seeing a trend by software publishers to backing off making presentations. I am not really sure why this is happening. Many have canceled in the last year because they are changing jobs. I certainly hope the major players are not dedicating less and less resources to serving the user group community. It has been proven in the past that we have a loud voice. I hope to get a letter out to the major software companies to get them in sometime this year. I have conversed on-line with several user group leaders and they are seeing the same trend that I am, so we are not imagining this curtailment.

Newsletter

I cannot say enough about the newsletter. Rick Kucejko has done an outstanding job. I will be the first to admit, I was a little worried (okay a lot worried) when Don asked to find someone else to pick up this difficult job. Rick has not only stepped into this role without skipping a beat, but is also making some fine suggestions for new topics and ideas to improve on our fine

publication. Please see many of Rick's ideas for articles such as the "How I use my computer" column he is trying to start in other parts of this edition. I get to read many different user group newsletters (and write for a couple) and I know ours stands up as one of the best in the country. We are not very big, but the content is great. Of course I'm bias since I contribute to the success.

How can we improve the WYSIWYG? One of my goals is to get many others to contribute. I always have felt that great newsletters are the combined efforts of many article authors. 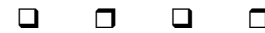

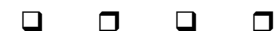
The basic purpose of the SIG is to help educate members about how they can make use of their computer's ability to communicate with other computers.

November Michigan ComputerUser Commentary

I Hope Santa was good to everyone and that your New Year is safe! See ya at the January meeting.

I have promoted the Michigan ComputerUser Magazine publication to the membership in the Sterling Heights Computer Club as one of the good reads in the computer publication industry. Over the years I have recommended this publication because it provided honest and easy to understand material.

This month I want to tell the membership that the article comparing the various Windows databases was the worst written article I have read in years. This article was misleading and filled with untruths.

I write database applications for a living. I have been doing this for over 7 years. I have used several of the databases mentioned in this article. I am an expert in FoxPro and Visual FoxPro, and am very familiar with MS Access. I also have a "competitor's" view of dBASE and a very basic working knowledge of Paradox. I was so angered by this write-up that I feel Joe

Rudich should not be published by Michigan ComputerUser or any of the sister publications ever again! My favorite mistruth is that the next version of FoxPro is going to be delayed for 2 more years! The next generation of FoxPro, Visual FoxPro 3.0 was released this past June 20th, and it took less than 2 years to be developed! It is considered by many industry gurus to be the superior database development product. This product is the first product to earn the Win95 Logo. Not only that, but this product not only runs under Win95, Windows NT 3.51, but can also run on the "old" Win 3.11 platform as well.

The author mentioned several times how slow FoxPro is. The 2.6 version is over a year and a half old, and for all intensive purposes, the basic FoxPro database engine was not improved in v2.6. Therefore the base engine is almost 3 years old, and it still out performs all other PC database products on the market today (based on independent 3rd party benchmarks completed by MicroEndeavors Inc of PA).

The other major mistruths are strewn throughout the MS Access portion of the article. Most serious developers with mission critical apps do not trust reputations on Access, they go with FoxPro, dBASE, or one of the many SQL databases.

I underlined 20 mistruths, lies, and twisted facts in this article. This was just in the MS Access and FoxPro sections where my expertise is. I can only assume that the other sections were given this same injustice. I will not look at this publication with the same eye again, which is truly a shame.

I can appreciate a true evaluation of competing products. To do this you have to have an open mind and fair testing and evaluation criteria. I would like to see the criteria and standards used for this comparison.
