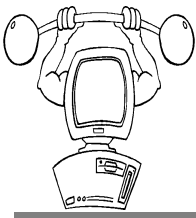

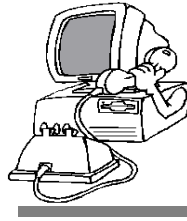


The next meeting for the Power Users SIG is May 27, 1997, at 7:30PM, at Mt. Clemens General Hospital.

Q: From Anonymous:
What are all these "="s and "=20"s speckled throughout my e-mail?

A: When your e-mail program encounters a character that it doesn't know what to do with, it places the code for that character after an '=' sign. I'm not sure, but I believe the number is the octal value of the character.

The =20 usually indicates a hard line break. Other values usually represent characters that are not in your character set.

A good way to get rid of these characters is to upgrade your e-mail program to one that is MIME compatible. MIME stands for Multipurpose Internet Mail Extensions. It can be used to send formatted documents, sound, or even video across the internet. MIME is quickly emerging as THE standard for e-mail.

Software Review : Lifeform

LIFEFORM, a total personal health management system by Fitnesoft Inc. of Orem, Utah is a very basic system of organizing and tracking your efforts toward better health. It installed very easily on my 486-33 w/ 8mb ram. It also requires Windows 3.1 or higher with 8mb hard drive space. However, it does appear to be a space hog since my basic install with one user personal data entered for one day used about 14 mb.

At any rate, the number of users you can track is only limited by your hard drive space. You can just as easily store your data on a floppy. And, each user can be password encrypted. Data entered can be as detailed or simple as you want it to be, by day/week/month or whatever.

It consists of eight pages per user:

FOOD: By detailing up to three meals per day, it tracks calories and saturated fats, carbohydrates, fiber, sugars, and proteins by meal and/or day, giving both weight and % of total, in either numerical and /or graphical format.

EXERCISE: Detailed as finite as you wish, it maintains 30 preset activities, and you can also add your own. It calculated consumption of energy (fat?) by type of activity and length of time spent.

MEASUREMENTS: Detailed with 20 of the standard bodily measurements (height, weight, neck, chest/bust, waist, hips), in addition to blood pressure, heart rate, temperature, and weight, to name a few.

CHEMISTRY: You can add your own to the 30 preset detail chemical attributes.

RATINGS: You can add your own

to the 62 detail physical and emotional predetermined statuses.

HISTORY: Basically a notes device, you can record anything you like.

GRAPHS: Printable in either graphical and or report format, you can chart your progress either by the raw data, daily, weekly, or monthly.

Although I anticipated it would be more comprehensive regarding the medical histories, it very definitely can be extremely advantageous to any individual who has the objective to track the progress made toward achieving a goal of weight control,

muscle tone/development, etc. It is also an excellent tool for reporting to your physician the results and/or any side effects of any medications, or any other programs prescribed..

As I alluded to above, it would be a terrific program if it had the ability to track any medication by name, type, function or purpose, costs, insurance coverage, side effects, etc. Similarly if it could track the physician history, it would be a very fine piece of software, especially at tax time. For the price of \$29.95 it is a very nice, easy to use, and handy program.



New Horizons Class

For my New Horizons free class for club members, I took the Beginning PowerPoint 4.0 class. I have the program as part of MS Office, but I have not used it previously. I always intended to learn it, but never seemed to have the time to do it.

This New Horizons course was an all day course, on a Saturday. I enjoyed the class, and learned a lot about PowerPoint. The documentation provided with the class was complete, and thoroughly covered the topics taught in the class, and was very easy to understand. The booklet provided is a step by step procedure on how to do the things demonstrated in the class.

At times I thought the class went too slow, and at times I got lost and had to ask for help on some things. Overall, this was about the right speed and depth for me to learn the program.

I think I could have read the manual at

home, tried the program and learned it that way. By learning the program like this, I think my understanding of it would not have been as thorough as taking the course. The way I tackle a new program is to read the documentation, and then try it. Being shown how to do things, with a complete explanation, while trying it on a computer, worked well for me. Since there are similarities between Microsoft programs, I learned new ways to do things that will work on other programs I run.

Overall, I thought the day at this training class was a worthwhile activity,

few years ago in *The Source*.

- Make news releases to the press. We currently send in meeting announcements to a dozen or so publications. The press releases will be different by announcing featured presenters or topics being presented at our meetings as a public service to the community.
- Get on cable channel news program. Channel 5 in Sterling Heights has a news program which could do a piece on the SHCC.
- Look into getting publicity on PC Talk on Sundays on WXYT Radio.
- Eliminate the offer to extend membership to members that get someone new to join the SHCC. This is something members should be willing to do without the incentive. Each additional month membership is extended costs the club a significant amount of the budget. I cannot stress this enough, most members are members because they heard from someone else how good the SHCC is. Please bring a friend to a meeting.

Ideas that were dropped in the "Future Bin" (to be looked at in detail at a later date):

- E-mail the newsletter to members that want to subscribe to this type of mailing. This way members that want the electronic version can do so, and those that prefer the paper copy can continue to do so.
- Sponsor an essay contest through the local school systems. This will require a bit of coordination and

research with the local school systems. The idea is to get a flyer into the students hands, have them discuss this with their parents who see it is sponsored by a local computer club. The students benefit by doing some creative writing and winning a prize, the club gets some publicity.

Ideas rejected:

- Workshop for members. The idea was to charge members to come to a workshop put on by several of our more knowledgeable members. This defeats the purpose of the club and would require a vote by the members since membership gets you entry into each sponsored meeting. This is stated in the constitution. There is also plenty of costs to put a workshop on like room rent, material duplication, and some miscellaneous costs. We get the school and library rooms for free because we don't charge for access. This also defeats the purpose of the group which is to get an education on computers for the cost of dues.

- The "Branch Office" idea defeats the purpose of the expense reduction since we would have the overhead of renting a second room location. Room rent is our number one expense.
- Hold a 50/50 drawing requires a license. Several members suggested that they rather the dues be raised \$5.00 a year than be nicked and dimed each month with a drawing.
- Raffle off a computer system. This is high risk and high admin costs. Besides most of our members already have a PC or would rather pick out their own system.
- Place a trailer/ad on the cable system. This idea was looked into some time ago and was not cost effective.

The officers are always reviewing ideas to reduce costs, increase membership, and make presentations interesting for

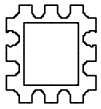

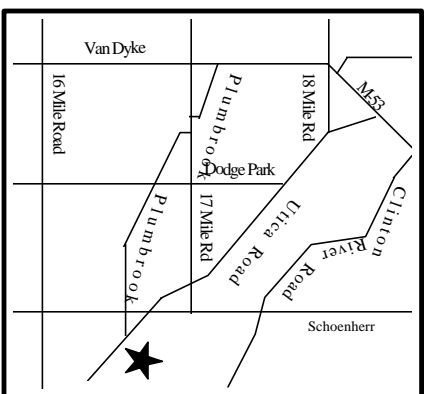
