time, which is Macomb County Library at 7:00PM. One of the club's members will be there to host the meeting for open questions and answers.

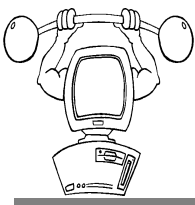

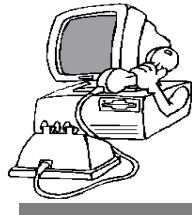

In December, Tim Kucejko discussed creating web pages, and then showed some of the web pages he has done, including the new SHCC web page, which was not yet up on the web.

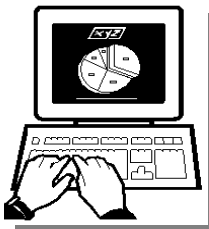
Each month the members of the Net/Com SIG visit the Internet to help members of the SHCC learn more about this powerful communications media.

Tips and Tricks: Restoring a Deleted File

This article was reprinted, with permission, from the APCUG REPORTS.

You have deleted a file. Thinking you really didn't need the file, you also deleted it from the Recycle Bin. Or, the file didn't make it to the recycle bin. Now you need to recover the file. Is it gone? Maybe not....read on..

A. Check the Recycle Bin. Many files deleted from local drives end up in the Recycle Bin. If the file is in the recycle bin:

- 1) Highlight the file.
- 2) Select from the Menu, File, Restore. The file is recovered if it was recoverable.

For many reasons, the file may not be in the recycle bin.

If you determine the file is not there, then:

B. Restart the machine and go to the DOS prompt. (It is one of the options on the Start menu under Shutdown.)

C. Go to the directory that contained the file you wish to recover.

D. Type Lock C: (If you have more than one local drive, or the drive is partitioned, the drive will be different.) Lock the drive from which you need to recover the file).

E. Type Undelete. Press the enter key.

F. DOS will list deleted files. The first character will be replaced by a ?. If you wish to recover the file, when asked if you wish to recover the file, press Y. Otherwise press N.

G. If you select a file to recover, DOS will then ask for the first letter of the

file. Supply a letter. (Even if you select a letter that is not the correct one for the file name, do not worry, you can always rename the file later.)

H. The file is now recovered (if it was recoverable at all.)

I. Type: Unlock C: (or whichever drive you locked in step D above).

NOTE: *The lock/unlock steps shown above are required. Windows 95 will prevent DOS from writing directly to the hard drive. Running undelete before locking the drive, will cause the corrupter to crash.*

J. Restart the computer

ADDITIONAL NOTES:

1. Even after a file is deleted from the Recycle Bin in Windows 95, it can be recovered using Undelete.

2. As soon as you realize a file was accidentally deleted, the recovery must start. Deleting a WordPerfect file does not mean you can keep using Excel until you decide you want to recover the file. The sooner you try to recover, the better the chances of recovery.

3. The reason these procedures work, is because DOS does not erase a deleted file. The file remains in place, DOS simply considers the space used by the file as free space. By starting recovery procedures immediately, you can recover the file before DOS puts something else in the "free space" occupied by the deleted file.

4. Procedures that move files and re-write

the File Allocation Table (Defrag, re-formatting a hard drive) will delete the erased files beyond the capability of the restore procedures contained in these instructions.

5. Certain files deleted in Windows 95 do not go to the Recycle Bin. Files deleted from external drives (such as a network or Zip drive), or from a floppy disk never make it to the Recycle Bin. If you use File manager and delete files, or the capability in Word 6 or WordPerfect 6.1 to delete files, the files will not go to the Recycle Bin. You must use undelete to recover them.

6. Undelete only works with DOS version 5 and later. (Yes there are Windows undelete utilities with DOS 5 and there are other utilities that provide the same function. However, the icons may not be present in Windows 3.1 on each machine, and not everyone has the utilities.)

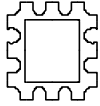

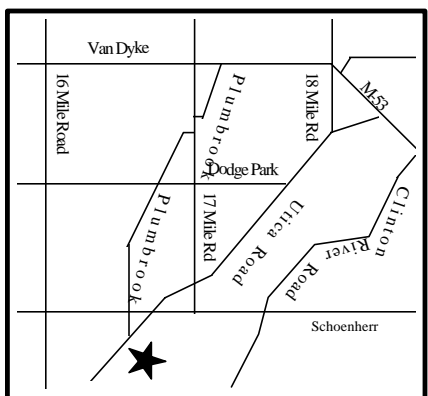
