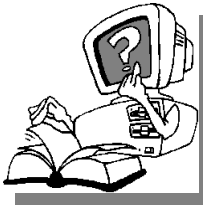

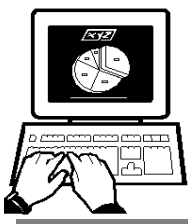
We still need volunteers for presenters for the Novice SIG. Can anyone help? If there are any club members who could help with his very important activity, please see Ellen Geering.

1998, starting at 7:00PM, at the Macomb County Library.

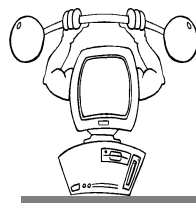
At the October meeting, Heather Newman, computer and Internet columnist for the Detroit Free Press, will be returning. This time, she will teach the group how to use search engines efficiently.

Macomb County Library. This is different than the normal fourth Tuesday of the month for this meeting.

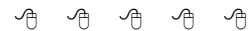

Q: Dear Expert,

While defragging my hard drives, I noticed that there are a number of blocks marked as “unmovable.”

I can understand the static nature of the system files at the start of the partition, and the large, continuous block is obviously Windows's swap file, but what accounts for the others?

I don't use any copy-protected software, let alone any that require absolute disk addresses. Any bad blocks are marked accordingly.

A: Dear Member:

Unmovable blocks can be caused by a number of things. You touched on a few in your e-mail. The swap file is unmovable because it is generally in use when the defragmenting is taking place. Blocks may also be marked as unmovable if they are used as part of a copy-protection or are part of a hidden file. Bad blocks are also marked as unmovable. This makes it a little difficult to determine exactly why your blocks are mark unmovable.

Here are some things to try:

1) Reduce your swap file (or remove it) and defragment again. It's possible the unmovable blocks are non-contiguous pieces of the swap file.

2) The unmovable blocks may be left-over from some copy-protected software. You may need something like Norton's Disk Doctor to recover the space.

3) They might be part of a hidden or system file. Since hidden or system files can be part of copy-protection. These are usually marked as non-movable. You can use DIR /AH /S from the root directory to show hidden files. DIR /AS /S will show system files. WARNING: make sure you leave IO.SYS and MSDOS.SYS alone.

4) If these are bad blocks (yes I know you said they weren't), then you may be able to recover them using Disk Doctor. I wouldn't. Odds are good that those blocks will go bad again and take your data with them.

If these steps don't work I wouldn't worry about it much. Those blocks probably aren't affecting your performance much. If they really bother you, you can always reformat and re-install. Just make sure you have good backups first :-)

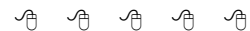
Copiers Needed

This is not only a "label program", it is a versatile utility desktop publisher. It not only adds professional results to your labels, but to all your printed materials, including business cards, name tags, postcards, file folders and almost anything else you might think up. Whether you are organizing your home records and files, running a business, or are a desktop publishing professional, you'll appreciate the easy use and quality output found in DesignExpress.

Their **SmartDesigns** saves you time and learning by giving you hundreds of label designs for most common tasks. You simply supply the text. Variations for layout, graphic elements, and font selections are a mouse click away.

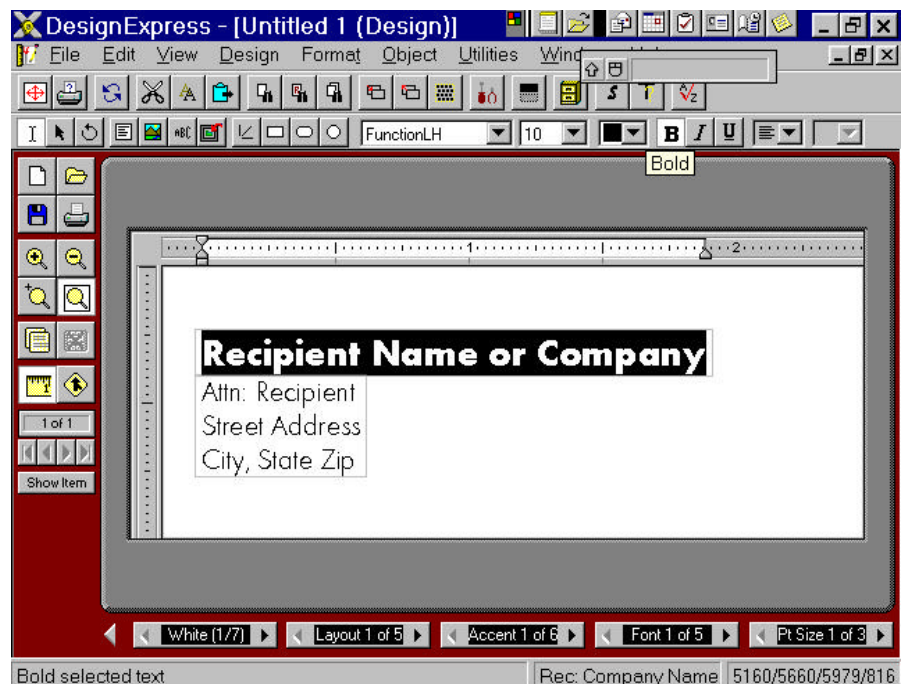
DesignExpress comes with complete support for the Avery line of labels and specialty papers. They have even cross-referenced products from other vendors, so that you can easily choose the most cost-effective paper products

from your favorite source. This means no measuring, or setting up complex word processor templates, simply select the product you want to use, and get started.

DesignExpress can merge with databases in the industry standard dBASE (.dbf) and ASCII Delimited (.csv or .txt) formats. If your database program uses a different format (i.e. Access, Excel, etc), they will almost certainly export a database in either of the two supported formats. Also, the Built-In Personal Database lets you create and manage small databases right inside of DesignExpress.

System Requirements: PCs running Windows 3.1 or higher, 4MB of Ram, and 4MB free disk space. Page Printer required.

Election Announcement

It is time to choose and elect our officers. Here is the process, the jobs, and responsibilities:

The nomination process is fairly simple. You can nominate yourself or have another person nominate you for one or more of the offices. All the offices (president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer) are elected for a one-year term starting in January and completing in December. Nominations are taken in October and just before the elections in November. You must be a member to be nominated.

The elections are held at the regular meeting closest to November 1st, as stated in our constitution. This year the elections will be on November 3, 1998. The easy way to remember this is that we hold our elections on the same night as the local and national elections are held. Only members of the SHCC present at the November meeting can vote. Ballots will be handed out at the sign-in door. The elections are held during the business portion of the meeting. The person with the majority of the vote in each office is the winner.

The jobs of each office are flexible. Some are defined, some change from office to office depending on the officer's capabilities and availability.

In reality the president makes sure the meeting topics are set, the speakers are prepared, writes thank you notes to presenters and door prize contributors, runs the regular club and officer meetings, publishes the minutes to the officer meetings, takes phone calls from potential members and sends information to them, audits the monthly treasurer report and membership databases, and tracks door prizes. The WYSIWYG column is optional, but a great forum to pass

along information to the members. The president also makes sure that the different coordinators are appointed and do their jobs. The president enforces the constitution and Club's policies. The president also does whatever things cannot be done by anyone else. The big key to this job is delegation. The more the president delegates the less there is to do.

The vice president has the catch all job. So far to date the vice-president has not had to step in for the president, and there have not been any state funerals that they have had to attend. This is an important job. They person must be flexible and be prepared to run the regular and officer meetings if the president cannot attend. This officer usually picks up a project or two during the year to lift the burden from other officers.

The secretary maintains the membership database, which is tracked in PC-File. They also put together "New Member Packets" and gives them to newly joined members, and members who renew. These packets are already printed, some assembly required! The secretary audits the treasurer report to make sure that the membership money collected matches the membership counts in the database, print the mailing labels for WYSIWYG mailing and several reports such as a membership list and

attendance sheet. Copies are made for all officers as needed. The secretary makes sure that sign-in table materials needed at each regular meeting are there before the meeting and before people start to show up.

The treasurer maintains all the money taken in and paid out from the Club's checking account. The SHCC currently uses Quicken to track the funds and generate reports for the officers. The treasurer also audits the membership counts. The treasurer makes reports to the officers at the officers meeting and four times a year to the Club's membership. All the receipts are collected and maintained by the treasurer.

All the officers attend the officer meeting that takes place on the second Tuesday of the month, starting at 7:30 PM. The time and date are flexible, and is made to the liking of all officers.

I hope everyone considers this invitation, this call to service (especially for president <g>). It is some work, and it is a lot of fun. Normally it takes 3 to 5 hours a month (give or take a few hours) outside of the meetings. The president's job might take a little more, but remember that delegation can lower the burden. If you have any questions concerning the duties, feel free to give me a call.

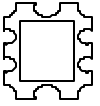

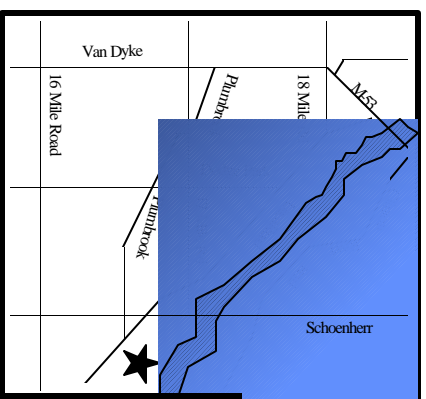
