WebExpress

Reviewed by Rick Kucejko

Web Express is a program that allows you to create web pages without having to know much about HTML (Hypertext Markup Language). It is advertised as being simple for novices to use, yet offer things for experts.

The club web page was done using HTML code, using only the basic Notepad text editor that comes with Windows. My son Tim did some of it, and I did some of it. That was an

interesting few months of effort during a summer, and did result in some quality father/son time, since this was an extensive effort. We have both gotten more proficient with HTML, and have done other web pages using it.

This review was my first experience with a program such as this for making web pages. I must admit that it was a pleasant surprise to me, seeing how fast





Q: Dear Expert:

My PC’s BIOS reports the 96 Meg of memory that’s physically installed, but Win95 shows (and presumably uses) only 64 Meg.

How do I tweak Win95 to recognize and use all the available memory?

Inquisitive

A: Dear Inquisitive:

It sounds like you’re using an early version of Windows 95 called revision A or OSR1. This revision had a problem with certain motherboards determining the amount of installed memory. I’ve been told that OSR2 fixes this problem. However there is no upgrade from OSR1 to OSR2. Microsoft claims that even though Windows 95 reports 64M it is still able to use the memory above 64M through it virtual memory manager. This sounds a little fishy to me, but perhaps it is true. In any case, it is annoying to have Windows lie about the amount of memory so here are some possible fixes.

1) The first thing I’d try is to install the service pack for OSR1. This may include an upgrade to himem.sys and is available at: <http://www.microsoft.com/windows/software/servpak1/sphome.htm>

2) If that doesn’t work, you might try installing Window 95B (OSR2). This should correct the probelm. It also

might be possible to simply replace the HIMEM.SYS file with the one from the OSR2 revision.

3) Upgrade to Windows 98. As far as I know this problem does not exist in Windows 98.

and easy web pages can be made with such a program. If we had this program when doing the club web page, we would have done it much quicker. We would have spent our time working on form and content, and would have had to spend very little time on the actual programming.

WEB PAGES

The program has a "wizard" which will let you start out with a professionally designed web site that you can modify to fit your needs. There are various designs available. Then there are various buttons, backgrounds, and other graphics available for customizing this site quickly into a site that can suit your purpose. In any case, it is only necessary that you have some idea of what you want to do before you start.

BASICS

Web browsers and computer systems on the Internet are different, and a web page can appear different in them than the page designer intended. That makes the job of designing a web page more difficult. It also limits the choices possible in design, fonts selected, etc. Designing web pages involves more limited choices than designing publications with desktop publishing.

Working with text in Web Express resembles that of a word processor as much as possible for a web page. Using fonts, size, bold, italic, and color are similar to using a word processor.

Graphics are easy to work with, and very similar to working with them in desktop publishing. You merely select the graphic, place the cursor where you want the graphic to appear, click an icon, and it loads in. It appears where it is placed. The graphic can also be sized in place. It is only necessary to select it, and drag a side of the image. Locating or sizing a graphic using only

HTML code is much more difficult.

Since GIF and JPEG are the two main graphic formats on the Internet. This program gives you the option to convert other graphics formats to one of these. Other formats will not be viewed by all browsers.

BEYOND THE BASICS

Tables are very useful on web pages for keeping text and graphics located in relation to each other. With HTML code, setting up a table to place things right where you want, can be difficult. With Web Express, it is only necessary to place the cursor where the table is desired, and click on an icon. A screen appears, asking for the number of columns and rows, and then the table appears across the web page. The table can then be sized, and the cells combined relative to each other as desired. Text or graphics can then easily be added to each cell.

Links are easy to set up with this program, in less than a minute. It is only necessary to highlight the text or select the graphic to be linked, and click an icon. Then a table comes up listing the web pages currently available. It is only necessary to click on an available page, add a different page title, add a page title from somewhere on the Internet, or add an e-mail address for email links. If the page with the link does not exist, the program asks if it should create a new page.

Bookmarks are equally easy to set up. It is only necessary to first locate where the bookmark is desired, and add a bookmark name. Then, it can be linked as described above.

One feature I really liked was a seemingly minor issue for this program. The program allows text to be easily added to a graphic. This is very useful for creating custom buttons. On the club web page, this was a much more difficult thing to do.

As I need to add new buttons on the club web page in the future, I will convert them all to buttons created with this program.

I was able to open pages from the SHCC web page in this program and make changes. Thus, it is not necessary that pages be developed in this program, to be modified by this program.

The instruction manual is very clear on how to do things. Also, the program itself is fairly intuitive. In the instruction manual, explanations are given on the use of the various features in making a web page. This extra information, beyond the mechanics of how to do things, was useful and interesting.

EXPERT LEVEL

There are other options available for use by more advanced users, such as supporting HTML language extensions, HTML tags and blocks, and scripts like JavaScript. Meta-commands, ActiveX controls, and sound tracks like Digital audio and MIDI music. Marquees and Multimedia plug ins are also supported. These can add pizzazz to a web page, but goes beyond the basics.

WEBSITE MANAGER

There are 2 parts to this program. All of the items described above take place in the page development window. The Website Manager keeps track of the structure of the pages, as well as all the links, images, and bookmarks. This is a quick way to find a particular place in the pages. It can also quickly show which links are not set up properly. This feature makes it easy to keep track of the details of the web site structure, as the web site gets complex with multiple pages and links.

SUPPORT

I did not need to call for support for this evaluation. The manual and program help were good. There is a

web site that supports this program, at <http://www.mve.com>. There are updates to the program for registered users, along with additional graphics, buttons, and backgrounds for web pages. Other things are available for download as well. There are also other links to places of interest for web designers. An online tutorial is also available at the web site.

SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS:

The program is available for Windows95 and Windows 3.1. For the Windows95 version, the system requirements are:

- PC with 486 or faster processor
- Windows 95 or NT (version 3.51 or later)
- 8 MB RAM and 8 MB of free hard disk space
- CD-ROM drive
- Internet (ISP) account

COST

The retail price is \$69.95. It is available as a download from the web page. Trial versions are available for download as well, from: <http://www.mve.com>. The product is made by MicroVision Development.

RECOMMENDATION

Overall, I would recommend this program to anyone wanting to make web pages. If you have never done this before, or are a novice, or are an intermediate web page programmer, this program will definitely be useful to you. It will save you time in making your web page. It will not limit your creativity, and will let you do what you want as much as possible in the HTML system. You can concentrate on form and content rather than the programming to get things done.

There are features that can make an expert look good. Also, for experts, or those who like writing HTML code, this program will allow you to add the code to your pages as you like. It will leave the added code there, even if it

doesn't understand it. This will allow new things to be added which are developed after this program was written.

Since this program allows current web pages to be opened and modified, I will be using this program for updating and improving the SHCC web page in the coming months. This was a fun program to evaluate, and I think I will get a lot of use out of it in the future.



IDT WinChip C6 200

This article first appeared on the SEMCO DataBus, and is being reproduced with permission.

This is a review of the IDT WinChip C6 200 MHz CPU install in a Biostar M5ATA motherboard. Our APCUG Delegate at the Winter Comdex was given an offer to review this new CPU. I was asked by the delegate if I would be interested in reviewing the WinChip. Since I was looking for a new motherboard or computer for my niece, I agree to do a review of the CPU.

The IDT Centaur Technology offer had two options, one was to ship the WinChip C6 200 MHz without a motherboard and you furnish your own motherboard, or two buy a Biostar M5ATA motherboard from the designated vendor and the CPU will be install on the motherboard. I chose the second option to buy the motherboard, as a motherboard was needed to replace the old 486 motherboard in my niece's computer.

The IDT WinChip C6 CPU is a competitor to Intel's Pentiums, AMD, and Cyrix CPU chips. This chip is plug compatible with the above mention chips on a motherboard equipped with a Socket 7. Like the Pentium chip it requires only a single voltage system board compare to the Pentium MMX that requires a dual voltage system board. It can be use in Portable machines as well as Desktop machines. The chip is available in four different speeds 180 MHz, 200 MHz, 225 MHz and 240 MHz. The Die size is much smaller then the Pentium MMX, 88-mm sq. compares to 128-mm sq. The power dissipation is also much less 10.4w at 3.52v, compare Pentium MMX 15.7w at 2.8v, both chips being the 200 MHz versions.

The on board caches on the WinChip is twice the size of the Pentium MMX caches.

The new motherboard is the Biostar M5ATA a baby AT design. It has 4 PCI slots and 3 ISA slots none shared. The motherboard has four 72-pin SIMM sockets and two 168-pin DIMM socket for a design total of 256MB of memory. The Pipelined Burst SRAM is 512K. The IDE support includes LBA mode and PIO Mode 5 with 4 devices. The IO devices install are one multi mode Parallel Port, two 16550 UART Serial Ports, and both a standard AT KB and PS/2 KB connectors. Available options are Universal Series Bus, P/S2 Mouse, and IrDA Connector. The motherboard comes with Award PnP Bios and an ALi Super TX chipset (not Intel). This motherboard will support the dual voltage CPU's like the Pentium MMX, but that option is not required for the single voltage WinChip C6.

In late January after receiving confirmation and instruction from IDT / Centaur the manufacturer of the WinChip. I order my motherboard and CPU from TC (Treasure Chest) Peripherals and received it in several days. The motherboard box from Biostar was sealed by Biostar tape indicating that Biostar had install the CPU on the motherboard and not the vendor. Included in this sealed box besides all the IO cables were the M5ATA motherboard user's manual and the IDT WinChip C6 Data Book

This resulted in the first of the two problems I had with this motherboard and CPU. Neither the instruction from WinChip or the sales person at TC Peripherals indicated that a heat sink and fan was required for the CPU. Therefore before installing the new motherboard, I had to make a run to a

local computer store to buy a 586 CPU cooler and heatsink compound.

I install 32 MB EDO Ram on the motherboard and the CPU cooler, verify all the jumpers and options on the motherboard. The next step was to install it into the case after removing the old 486 motherboard. I hook up all the cables required and the old video card I put in an ISA slot. The next step was to apply power that resulted in the computer booting up into Windows 95. This was the first time I had done a motherboard swap that the machine boots up on the first try. There was a small second problem and that was the HD LED did not light on the case when the Hard Drive was active. After messing around with this thing for an hour including trying to hook up the Turbo LED in place of the HD LED that was on the case, I call tech support.

According to the instruction from IDT / Centaur the vendor was to supply support. I call TC Peripherals at their 800 number. After being put on hold by their automated phone system for about 10 minutes, Jack one of their service tech pick me up. After explaining my problem to him he told me he did not have a manual on the Biostar M5ATA motherboard and that it would take him several minutes to get a manual from his supervisor. Jack stated that this was a new motherboard from the manufacturer and this was the first call he had on it. He guided me through the steps to test the LED on the case and made sure I was connecting it on the correct pins and orientation. After going to these steps the LED start working. I don't know why unless I had + and - leads reverse. But I am happy to say that my experience with tech support at TC Peripherals was a good experience.
