The President's Pen

Mr. David Severino, a channel marketing representative, of Microsoft presented a very interesting meeting covering various Microsoft products including some Windows 2000. David will be returning in December to present "Great Gift Ideas for the Holiday". This will be another good presentation. We have had difficulties with the presenter planned for May so we have moved the June presenter up to May. Club member Rick Schummer will present 'Compression (Zip files) and backups'. We all have some data that we would hate to lose. Backups can save you hours and hours of work and even restore some files which are virtually impossible to replace. Just in our club alone within the last couple of months, at least one member has had a hard drive (C: drive) quit working and has lost a lot of stuff. Come find out how to protect your valuable data and how to do it more easily.

There are some strange things going on out there on the internet. Apparently some unscrupulous web sites download a program onto your PC. I believe it's a java script but I haven't confirmed this yet. Anyway, the downloaded program actually disconnects you from your ISP (hangs up your phone) and then uses your modem to dial a long distance phone number that is some place outside the country. The trick is the num-

ber is either a 900 number or similar, that is allowed to charge back to your phone number. When you get your next phone bill you have tens of dollars of charges from 'your call'. It's hard to protest because the phone company itself has records that you did indeed make the call(s) from your home phone to the number in question. The 'web site' you're visiting appears to be working because you're getting pages from it, you just don't know they're coming direct instead of through the web and your ISP. Many of these unscrupulous web sites specialize in adult content but this trick is not limited to them.

The second questionable activity that is happening on the net is some programs that are out there to be downloaded have been infected with something you might call a virus. It's actually an intelligence gathering utility which essentially spies on you and reports the information collected back to one or more web sites operated by the company that wrote the utility. Apparently this company sells information gathered by it's spy utility. This is all I've been able to find out about this so far, but I hope to have more information in the next couple of months.

On to brighter things. Do you still listen to the radio? Well you may want

Net/Com SIG



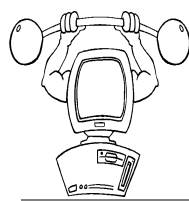

“Ask The Experts”

Q: Expert,

I have been looking into registering a domain name. Have you gone through this? The couple of sites I have looked at (which do registrations) make it appear as though you’re leasing the domain name for one or two years as opposed to ‘owning’ the name. What’s going on?

WannaBe.com

A: WannaBe,

I haven’t actually done this yet, but I did look into it quite a bit.

You are in fact leasing the name. In the olden days, you would register a name and it was yours forever. (It was also free) But, alas, due to abuses of the system, names are now leased for a 2-year basis. Generally it costs about \$70 for the first two years and \$35 a year after that. Some sites will give you a discount if you pay for 5 or 10 years in advance. As long as your name does not infringe on a registered trademark, you should always have first refusal on renewing your lease. So, if you want yourname.com, you should be able to keep it as long as you keep renewing the lease.

Once you receive the name, you must do something with it. This can be as little as registering it with a Domain Name Server (also known as parking) which simply reserved the name for you but you cannot have any web

pages, email addresses, etc. (although some services do present an “under construction” web page) Usually, you’ll want someone to “host” your site. This means you pay them a monthly fee and they hold your web pages and allow you access to change them as needed. They will also handle routing your email. Finally, if your ISP will assign you a static IP address, you can host your own web site. Make sure your connection is fast enough that it doesn’t annoy people wanting to view your site.

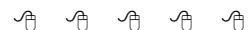

If you are still on Windows 95 or Windows 3.1 you may want to consider upgrading to the latest Windows 98. Win98 has fixed 3000 problems that existed in Win95, and it also has all the latest drivers for the new devices that are coming out on the market. Make the change and you will be happy that you did.

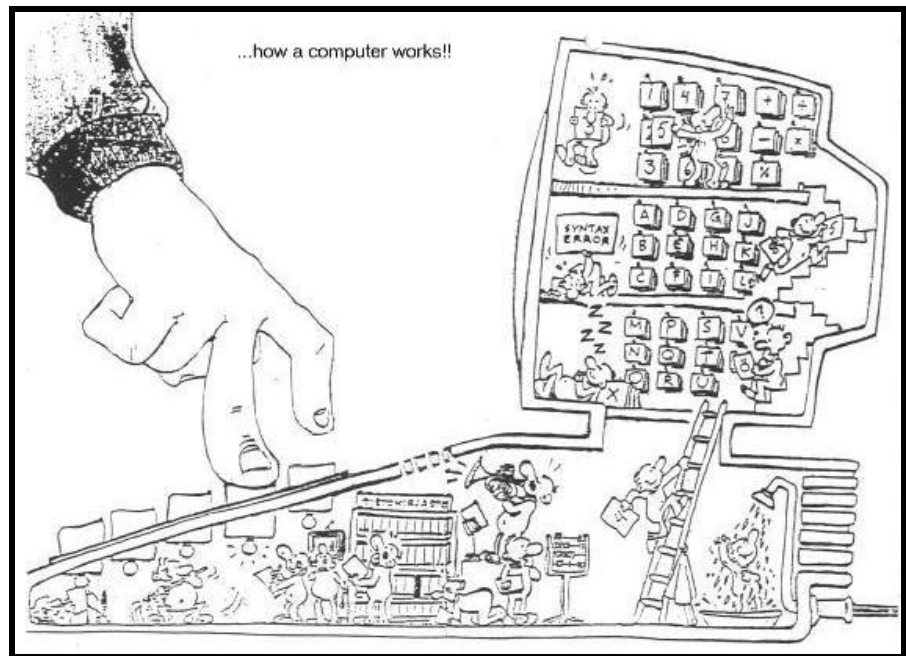
Many users have one pc but multiple users, for example, Dad, Mom, Son and Daughter. One may be left-handed, and one might like to use certain icons or have their mail separate from each other. It's very difficult remembering who read who's mail, so why not set up different identities for each one? It is very easy to do if you follow these instructions:

First click on Start, Settings, Control Panel, Passwords. You will see a tab that says user profiles, click on the second box that says users can customize their preferences. Then click on the two boxes below, which says, include desktop icons and start menu in user settings. Once these are checked you will have to restart your computer. When the computer is restarted you will get the sign on box that right now should have your name in it and a request for a password. Put in the new users name and password, i.e. Susan and password Susan. You will get a message that says, "You have not logged in at this computer before. Would you like this computer to retain your individual settings for use when you log on here in the future?" Click Yes. When you do this you will notice that the computer will create

duplicates of your original profile. You will be asked to enter your password again, and your screen will come up just like it was before you made these changes, but now you are in "Susan's" profile. Now go ahead and delete items from your desktop, change your wallpaper, and clean up your start menu. If you are not sure how to clean up your start menu, go to start, settings, taskbar and menu. Then click on the Start Menu Programs tab. In the Customize Start menu section, click on the Advanced button. You can now delete as many

of these items as you want. You can also go into your control panel again and change your other settings like the sounds, font size, and default startup programs. Just remember that the changes you are making here will only affect SUSAN, not your main identity. When you are done, restart your computer. If you log in as normal you will get your screen, and if you log in as SUSAN you will get her screen. This should save a few arguments in the house about everyone messing up each other's desktop.

The newsletter parallels the radio show but each has some things that the other doesn't have. One important fact in the last newsletter (April 15th) is that Illinois Avenue is mathematically the property most likely to be landed on in Monopoly. There is also a web site at <http://www.komando.com>. I like the newsletter though because you can file it to read next week if you're busy this week. The web site keeps on changing regardless of whether you've read it or not.



Miscellaneous Stuff, but important: Ameritech assigned a new area code, 586, to the communities previously using the 810 area code exclusively. This new area code (586) is an overlay area code, which means it will work in the same geographic area as 810. All existing telephone numbers will retain the 810 area code. However, new telephone customers, or existing customers needing additional lines will be assigned the 586 area code. If you remember years ago everyone around you had the same phone exchange. In some cases you only had to dial 4 or 5 digits for local numbers. Then after a time the phone company had multiple exchanges covering the same geographic area and you had to dial all 7 digits. Overlaying area codes is just the next expansion of how many phone numbers can be crammed into an area. When we get to overlaying area codes we'll have to dial all 10 digits for every call. It's unclear to me if when you have to dial all 10 digits, you have to prefix the call with a '1'.

The new area code was scheduled to go into effect on May 6, 2000. However, Ameritech has announced that the FCC has indefinitely suspended the implementation of the 586 area code. The FCC has apparently decided to consider various alternatives, including requesting public comment, before determining the best method of relieving the number shortage within the 810 area code.

The Novice SIG will hold it's first meeting this month (May). The SIG will follow the book "Quick Course in Microsoft Windows 98". If you're a novice and using Windows 95 this SIG and book will also be valuable to you since Windows 95 and 98 are very similar in most areas. If you are planning to attend the Novice SIG, the book is \$14. We believe you will find the book well worth it.

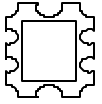

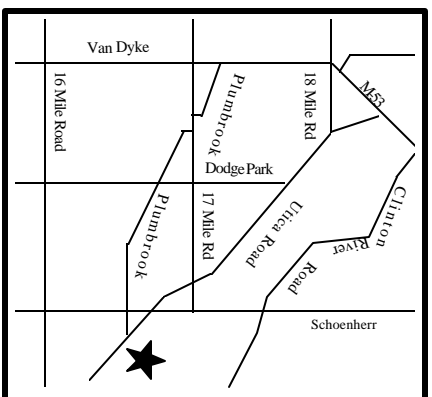
