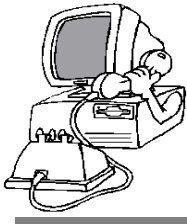

Net/Com SIG



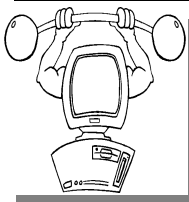

inside Abraham's drum and was accused of insider trading.

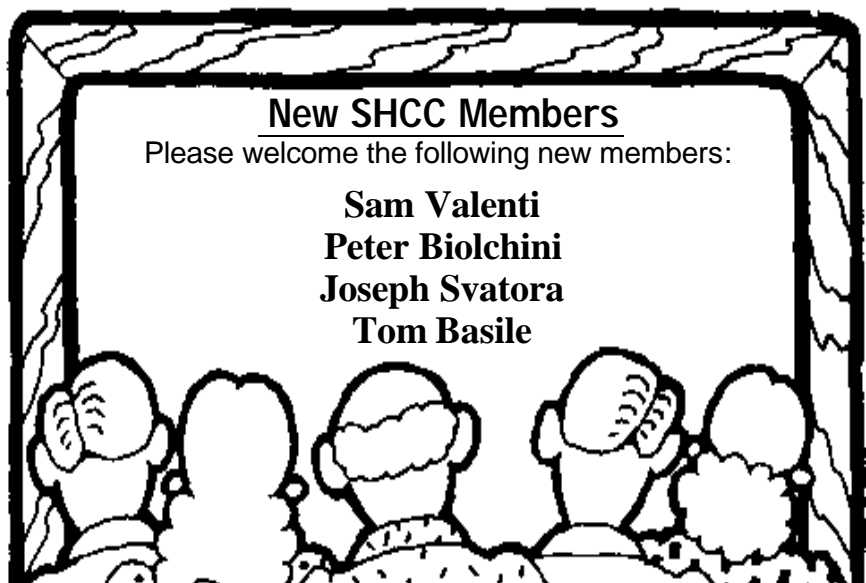

Jack's Place

Hello Everyone:

The topic for this month's column is a program called TweakUI. It is for Windows 2000, Windows NT, Windows Millennium Edition, Windows 98 or Windows 95. This program can be downloaded for free at <http://www.microsoft.com/networkstation/downloads/PowerToys/Networking/NTTweakUI.asp> The reason you want to download this program is that it allows you to make several changes to your system. These will help you adjust your menu speed, window animation and Microsoft Internet Explorer.

After downloading the program into a folder such as c:\tweakui, click on start and then run, and type "c:\tweakui\tweakui.exe. This is a self extracting exe file. Make sure you extract it to c:\tweakui. Then open up my computer and look for your Tweakui folder in your C drive. When you find a file called tweakui.inf do a right click on this file and click on install. Once the system is installed, go to your start button, then settings, then control panel. You will see a new box there called Tweakui. Open this box and start checking out the changes you can make. You will be able to make changes to your Desktop, My Computer, Control Panel, Logon, the New menu, Add/Remove programs you can't get rid of, Repair, Open files, Mouse speed and double clicks, Windows explorer, and Internet Explorer.

There are several changes that are must changes, at least for me.

In the IE section you can clear all documents, runs, and typed URLs and history upon exit. It will also put your Control Panel into your start Menu.

Do you have programs on your Add/Remove list that you know are gone but they are still listed? Click on Add/Remove and they will be gone for good. There are extensive repair facilities in case you mess up things like file associations and the like. If you go to the Paranoia section you can turn on the Faultlog which will keep track of any Windows faults, so that you will be able to describe the problem to a technician. You can also clear any or all of your history files upon closing down your computer. If you click on Desktop you will be able to eliminate those pesky folders on your main screen that you might never use, such as Network Neighborhood.

Do you have novices using your machine and don't want them to mess

around with your control panel? Go into Control Panel and hide all the scary stuff like ODBC Panels, or Power Management. If you use the Windows password, click on logon and the program will log you in automatically when your computer starts.

This program is probably the best program for tweaking your windows settings.

Election Announcement

It is time to re-elect our officers. Here is the process, the jobs, and responsibilities:

The nomination process is simple. You can nominate yourself or have another person nominate you for one or more of the offices. All the offices (president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer) are elected for a one year term starting in January and completing in December. Nominations are taken in October and just before the elections in November. You must be a member to be nominated or to nominate someone.

The elections are held at the regular meeting closest to November 1st, as stated in our constitution. This year the elections will be on November 7, 2000. The easy way to remember this is that we hold our elections on the same night as the local and national elections are held. Only members of the SHCC can vote. Ballots will be handed out at the sign-in door. The elections are held during the business portion of the meeting. The person with the majority of the vote in each office is the winner.

The jobs of each office are flexible. Some are defined, some change from office to office depending on the officers capabilities and availability.

In reality the president makes sure the meeting topics are set, the speakers are prepared, writes thank you notes to presenters and door prize contributors, runs the regular club and officer meetings, publishes the minutes to the officer meetings, takes phone calls from potential members and sends information to them, audits the monthly treasurer report and membership databases, tracks door prizes, and handles most of the publicity issues for the club. The WYSIWYG column is optional, but a

great forum to pass along information to the members. The president also makes sure that the different coordinators are appointed and do their jobs. The president enforces the constitution and Club's policies. The president does whatever things cannot be done by anyone else. The key to this job is delegation. The more the president delegates the less there is to do.

The Vice President has the catch all job. So far to date the vice-president has not had to step in for the president, and there have not been any state funerals that they have had to attend. This is an important job. They person must be flexible and be prepared to run the regular and officer meetings if the president cannot attend. This officer usually picks up a project or two during the year to lift the burden from other officers.

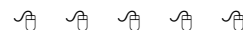
The secretary maintains the membership database which is tracked in an Access data base. They also puts together "New Member Packets" and gives them to newly joined members, and members who renew. These packets are already printed, some assembly required! The secretary audits the treasurer report to make sure that the membership money collected matches the membership counts in the database, print the mailing labels for WYSIWYG mailing and several reports such as a

membership list and attendance sheet. The secretary makes sure that sign-in table materials needed at each regular meeting are there before the meeting, and before people start showing up.

The treasurer maintains all the money taken in and paid out from the Club's checking account. The SHCC currently uses Quicken to track the funds and generate reports for the officers. The treasurer also audits the membership counts. The treasurer makes reports to the officers at the officers meeting and four times a year to the Club's membership. All the receipts are collected and maintained by the treasurer.

All the officers attend the officer meeting that takes place on the Wednesday after the second Tuesday of the month. Starts at 7:30PM, time and date are flexible to liking of all officers.

I hope everyone considers this invitation, this call to service. It is some work, and it is a lot of fun. Normally it takes 3 to 5 hours a month (give or take a few hours) outside of the meetings. The president's job might take a little more, but remember that delegation can lower the burden. If you have any questions concerning the duties, feel free to give any of the officers a call.



From the Secretary's Notebook

After complaining that I was being artificially limited from DSL technology, I am happy to report that broadband connectivity has reached the Schummer household. For the last month I have been surfing the web via my 144kbs connection from Voyager.Net and

Covad. I must admit that I was more than a little nervous with some of the horror stories floating around, but all is now well here in Sterling Heights.

I have been vocal about the "artificial restriction" to connecting to the web via broadband technologies. I have

said that the holders of the access to the web have set costs too high for the connection. In my case they were charging more for the 144/144kbs package than they were for the 384/128kbs or the 608/128kbs packages.

So it is time to give the DSL providers their due and promote what I feel is the best deal available to date. Naturally this deal may be better for me, and it should be noted that your budget may be different, as well as the need to connect to the web. Also the deal I have might not be available any longer.

Many of my friends and colleagues have noted that I have had an opportunity to connect to the web via a high-speed connection for several years. Certainly the Comcast Cable service in my area has offered cable modem access for years. But I have enough trouble keeping the TV signal clear, and frankly the customer support from these folks leaves more to be desired than to be respected. Sharing another network hub does not sound appealing. Despite all these reasons, the biggest reason I refuse to go with Comcast is the fact that they use smoke and mirrors to provide the "high speed". In talking to a tech it was noted that they cache many of the popular sites on the Comcast computers. If you go somewhere unpopular you might experience the same speed as a good modem. I tested this right in the Comcast offices in Warren. Not a pretty site.

So I have waited patiently for DSL. Competition is good and at this moment in time, the competition for your web access should work in your favor. I frequently called my ISP (Voyager) and kept asking if I was in range. A typical conversation went something like this:

RAS: Hello, my name is Rick Schummer and I live in Sterling Heights. I want to get DSL connectivity in my

home.

Voyager: Your address shows that you are in range for our 144/144 package, it runs \$69 a month.

RAS: So what you are saying is that I have to fork out an additional \$20 a month for one-third the performance of the standard DSL service?

Voyager: Um...yes.

RAS: So can I talk you folks into giving me the service for the same price as the slower speed?

Voyager: Well sir, that is not our policy. The technology is different and there are different costs involved, blah, blah, blah... (thinking: when will this guy stop bothering us!)

RAS: OK, thanks for your time, I hope you consider my suggestion; I'm guessing that you would get a truckload of customers if you changed your pricing.

Voyager: Thanks for calling.

As I noted on my website (RAS. Commentary: Getting Broadband in the Big City), I live too far from an Ameritech Central Office by DSL standards. This regulates me to have to accept the slowest of the DSL offerings. Distance is the big factor in determining what speed of DSL you can get. Finally in July my calling paid off. They lowered the price to \$49 a month with only a one-year commitment.

Speed was not that big of a concern since we have a 414kbs ADSL line in our office. 20 people also share it. At best I can expect 414/20, but reality checks in download speed shows that I get 150kbs on average. I find this performance quite acceptable. After all, it is 6 to 7 times faster than my dial up connection (thanks to the garbage phone lines in northern Sterling Heights, which belongs to the Utica exchange).

So I have been happily surfing with only a couple of glitches along the way. An added bonus is that I retain a dial up account so I can dial in when I am outside of my home with my notebook. All four computers are connected and

can simultaneously surf without the appearance of performance degradation.

Price Comparison:

DSL vs. Dialup:

\$49 includes ISP charges that were \$17 a month before DSL as well as removing an Ameritech phone line that was averaging \$28 a month.

Difference is $28+17=\$45$ vs. \$49 for DSL service (including dialup option). Loss is second phone line convenience

Cable vs. DSL:

Cable is \$40, which includes the modem rental, but you need full basic cable. Since I have Broadcast cable at \$16 a month, I would be adding \$14 a month to my cable bill, plus the \$40 for a total of \$54 additional.

With DSL I own the equipment, with a rebate in my pocket, at \$49 a month.

I also want to note that I know several people who are not as lucky as I have been. My parents struggled for weeks to stay connected (through Voyager). Other friends of mine have had similar stories with not being able to keep a solid connection. But my connection has been a pleasure, as several others I know. Getting email, doing research, hitting video sites, listening to music/radio, and updating my web page has never been faster from home.

Entry Level Questions Answered: What is the 'Task Bar' and the 'Tool Bar'?

The TASK BAR is the area at the bottom of your WIN9x screen that shows the applications that are currently running. The active application will look different, while the others will just show the names of the applications. Clicking a non-active application will cause that application to be displayed on the screen; on top of whatever else you may have displayed.

The TASK BAR on all WINDOWS systems can be relocated to the side or to the top of your screen if desired. To move it, just click and drag on a blank area on the TASK BAR and let go when your mouse is located within one inch of either side, or at least halfway up the screen from the bottom.

The TOOL BAR is a row or column of icons that appear, typically, at the top of the application screen. The functions will vary according to the application being used. For example, the tool bar for my Internet Explorer shows the BACK and FORWARD icons, as well as the STOP, REFRESH, HOME and others. Netscape COMPOSER shows the NEW, OPEN, SAVE, PUBLISH, PREVIEW, and others

Generally, the TOOL BAR is displayed below the MENU BAR, the topmost area, under the title and which contains the names like FILE, EDIT, INSERT and others.

If I delete an icon off my desktop, how do I start the program if I need it later?

Many users place shortcuts on the desktop to expedite the opening of a much used application. Some of the icons are placed there when the Operating System (OS) is installed, or when an application is installed. The MY

COMPUTER, NETWORK NEIGHBORHOOD, and the TRASH-CAN icons are typical of those placed there when the OS was installed. The Internet Explorer or Netscape Navigator icons are typically placed on the desktop for easy access when those applications are installed.

For the most part, deleted icons can easily be copied from another location and placed back onto the desktop, using the COPY OF or SHORTCUT TO method. To install a shortcut--the preferred option--here is what you can do. This will allow replacement of any application icon, or the addition of one you never had there before.

Find a blank space on the TASK BAR and RIGHT CLICK it. When the selection window appears, select PROPERTIES (Or click START, then SETTINGS, then select TASKBAR & START MENU. This displays the TASKBAR PROPERTIES. Now click the START MENU PROGRAMS tab, and then click the ADVANCED button in the window that appears.

The window EXPLORING-START MENU will display and you need to select the PLUS (+) sign next to PROGRAMS to expand the selection list. Of course, if your desired application is in a different folder in the initial display, select the folder and click the PLUS sign to the left of it instead. If no PLUS sign appears at the left of the desired folder, just LEFT CLICK that folder icon and the files in the folder will appear on the right side. (WIN98 users may have the VIEW AS A WEBPAGE turned ON and see the listing differently. If desired, for this configuration, select VIEWS and turn OFF, or uncheck the VIEW AS WEBPAGE selection in the drop down list.)

Now find the program you want to create a shortcut for and click the folder name. Look for the application name, like Acrobat Reader 4.0. RIGHT CLICK and DRAG the icon to an open space on your desktop. Obviously, in doing all this you definitely do NOT want all the window displays to be FULL SCREEN so that you can see the desktop. Once you have an open space positioned with the mouse, release the mouse and a drop down dialog window appears showing some selections. Select CREATE SHORTCUT(s) HERE and you now have your shortcut on the desktop. Repeat for other programs as desired.

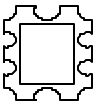

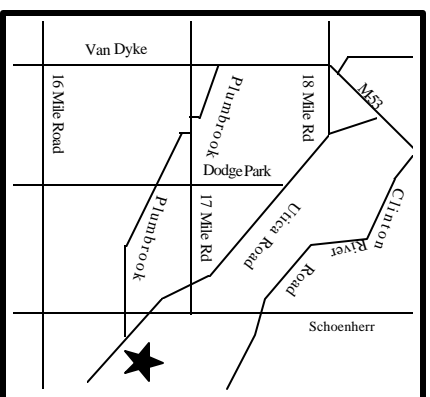
