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The President’s Pen

November already!! Time's a flyin'. We have big elections coming up in our political arena. We have elections coming up in SHCC for our four officers. Last but certainly not least, SHCC is 22 years old this month. It's hard to believe.

You'll be disappointed to know that your current and past officers are not qualified for public service. This is because we run your club in the black, that is we pay our bills with our own (SHCC's) money and still have some left over. This obviously objectionable behavior would never fly in a public office. Maybe the SHCC officers should increase their popularity by spending all the money in the treasury and coming back for a dues increase.

On other issues. If you missed last month's meeting you missed SHCC member Jack Vander-Schrier's presentation of "Utilities for Windows". Jack is a favorite presenter with the club members and didn't let us down.

This month "What's Hot for the Holidays" will be presented by Richard Tapaninen from Micro Center. Mr. Tapaninen has presented to SHCC many times. His knowledgeable and timely presentation of new and unique technology available at Micro Center is always a good time. When you visit Micro Center you can usually find Mr.

Tapaninen helping people or presenting one of Micro Centers seminars.

Have you noticed how the microcomputer technology spiral has stalled and is in the process of shifting gears? Here's what I mean. The technology of the physical microprocessors reached a sort of practical limit with the shrinking of the microprocessor. The forces that work against each other are heat and size. Each stroke of the clock causes all the microprocessor's logic to switch. Switching states causes a flow (minute as it is) of electrical current. Current flow causes heat. So the faster you clock any given circuit the more heat it generates. Second, to make a microprocessor run faster you need to shorten the tiny little wires that connect the internal parts of the microprocessor together. So as circuits are made faster they necessarily got smaller. The circuitry generates more heat in a smaller package making it harder to keep the circuitry cool. New technology might be developed in the future that will allow faster processors but for now the speed is hovering around the limit.

Before someone starts jotting off an email to me stating that there are faster processors now, let me frame this discussion by stating I'm talking generalities that are suitable for gen-

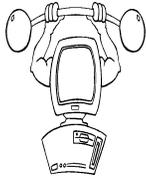

eral consumer microcomputers. Who wants or can afford to install a cooling tower outside their house just to run a PC?

So the next best thing if you can't make one expensive processor go faster, put two cheap processors together such that they do more jointly than the one does alone and at a lower cost. If two cheaper ones are better than one expensive one, then how about four, or how about eight. But this lead to the next problem that the software wasn't available to take advantage of the physical layout of multiple processors. Linux did this out of the box and Windows has caught up.

The next to catch up will be the application software.

With what's available today most applications still run on one processor (or core). So generally Windows runs on one processor and sometimes two, briefly. The application (program) you are actually using runs on one processor. Most of us just can't keep a multi-core microprocessor busy enough to actually use its potential.

Maybe some of the new technology Mr. Tapaninen will show us will take advantage of all the computing power.

Go vote on Tuesday, and then come to MCC for SHCC.



Replacing Text With A Graphic

There may be times when you have a need to replace text in your document with a graphic. For instance, you might be working on a marketing document and need to replace all instances of your company name with the company logo. This is simple enough to do in Word by following these steps:

1. Place the graphic in your document; it doesn't matter where.
2. Select the graphic.
3. Press **CTRL+X**. This removes the graphic, placing it in the Clipboard.
4. Press **CTRL+H**. This displays the Replace tab of the Find and Replace dialog box.
5. In the Find What field, enter the text you want replaced with the graphic.
6. In the Replace With field, enter **^c**, or click on Special and choose Clipboard Contents.

7. Set any other searching criteria, as desired.
8. Click on Find Next or Replace All, depending on how you want to make your replacements.

Continued 'Bring A Friend Program' For The Improved Door Prizes

The past "Bring A Friend" program has helped to bring new visitors to our club. Thus, we will continue this program for now.

I received some feedback from last month's comments about my flash drive experience. Paul Witheridge from the Sarnia, Ontario user group continued my comments about the accidental drive letter assignment being a coincidence because of the one time use to retrieve a file: he says "... except when you need to boot from that USB drive. In that case, your hard drive will be either disabled (dead or disconnected) or reordered in boot sequence on purpose. This is so the desired boot drive (USB in this case) can take the necessary C: letter assignment."

I responded that I wondered why a person would need to boot from a USB flash drive, proposing that "unless you were traveling and using a strange computer, or if you B & E'd a house to borrow the use of their computer temporarily," to which he responded; "Those are two scenarios, of course. Also, a dying hard drive, a severely virus infected hard drive, and running an alternative operating system are a few more."

I "think" I'm smarter now, but Paul is very knowledgeable so I hope you get something out of his comments.

More On My Ricoh Printer

In the past, I have mentioned how satisfied I was with my Ricoh color laser printer and their tech support. I was brought into a world of reality recently when the store I bought it from, located not very far from me, was closed due the loss of their lease. They

have other stores, but they are all much further away from me. Since I needed some toner cartridges, I went to Office Depot to get them, but they don't carry them for Ricoh. Neither does OfficeMax or Staples. None of the three were not interested in trying to order them for me and were unable to find them on their Web site. Their final response to me was "sorry, thank you, goodbye."

I called Ricoh and I can order them from "Ricoh Direct," but they are priced slightly higher than where I was buying them and the product would be shipped from out of town. There'd be a shipping charge unless I was a volume customer. No user group discount though, which our user group receives from "Smart Guys Computers" from whom I originally bought it, <<http://www.smartguyscomputers.com>>. Not only that, when inquiring about getting cartridges, I also found out that my free tech support had run out. However, the guy told me that if I had a somewhat simple question, they would answer it for me anyway; otherwise, there would be a charge. The good part is they speak English, answer quickly, and they know their stuff.

Actually, there is another store operated by Smart Guys Computers that I do get close to occasionally and I'll try to stock up so I won't run out of cartridges. That way I'll still get an extra discount. I don't go that direction very much so stocking up should solve the problem, but I was surprised to learn that cartridges for Ricoh printers were hard to find, considering that Ricoh has been around for years, and are widely used in commercial installations.

One thing I might mention is that I have not been overly impressed with the quality of the colored pages in newsletters that I've printed. There are

a few tiny lines vertically through the picture and I don't know if other brands might have that flaw too.

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Club Officer Election Announcement

It is time to re-elect our officers. Here is the process, the jobs, and responsibilities:

The nomination process is simple. You can nominate yourself or have another person nominate you for one or more of the offices. All the offices (president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer) are elected for a one year term starting in January and completing in December. Nominations are taken in October and just before the elections in November. You must be a member to be nominated or to nominate someone.

The elections are usually held at the regular meeting closest to November 1st. This year they were delayed for a month. The easy way to remember this is that we hold our elections on the same night as the local and

national elections are held, in years when there is a national election.

Only members of the SHCC can vote. Ballots will be handed out at the sign-in door. The elections are held during the business portion of the meeting. The person with the majority of the vote for the office is the winner, for each office.

The jobs of each office are flexible. Some are defined, some change from office to office depending on the officers' capabilities and availability. In reality the president makes sure the meeting topics are set, the speakers are prepared, writes thank you notes to presenters and door prize contributors, runs the regular club and officer meetings, publishes the minutes to the officer meetings, takes phone calls from potential members and sends

information to them, audits the monthly treasurer report and membership databases, tracks door prizes, and handles most of the publicity issues for the club. The WYSIWYG column is optional, but a great forum to pass along information to the members. The president also makes sure that the different coordinators are appointed and do their jobs. The president enforces the constitution and Club's policies. The president does whatever things cannot be done by anyone else. The key to this job is delegation. The more the president delegates the less there is to do.

The Vice President has the catch all job. So far to date the vice-president has not had to step in for the president, and there have not been any state funerals that they have had to attend. This is an important job. The person must be flexible and be prepared to run the regular and officer meetings if the president cannot attend. This officer usually picks up a project or two during the year to lift the burden from other officers.

The secretary maintains the membership database which is tracked in an Access database. They also put together "New Member Packets" and give them to newly joined members, and members who renew. These packets are already printed, some assembly required! The secretary audits the treasurer report to make sure that the membership money collected matches the membership

counts in the database, print the mailing labels for *WYSIWYG* mailing, and maintains several reports such as a membership list and attendance sheet. The secretary makes sure that sign-in table materials needed at each regular meeting are there before the meeting, and before people start showing up.

The treasurer maintains records for all the money taken in and paid out from the Club's checking account. The SHCC currently uses Quicken to track the funds and generate reports for the officers. The treasurer also audits the membership counts. The treasurer makes reports to the officers at the officers meeting and four times a year to the Club's membership. All the receipts are collected and maintained by the treasurer.

All the officers attend the officer meeting that takes place during the week after the club meeting. It starts at 7:30PM; time and date are flexible to the liking of all officers.

We hope everyone considers this invitation, this call to service. It is some work, and it is a lot of fun. Normally it takes 3 to 5 hours a month (give or take a few hours) outside of the meetings. The president's job might take a little more, but remember that delegation can lower the burden. If you have any questions concerning the duties, feel free to give any of the officers a call.



Free Utilities From CPUID

I am a fan of utilities, especially if they are free. Frequently, situations arise where it is necessary to know the details of a computer, including specifics about its software,

hardware, drivers, and other components in order to diagnose a problem and make recommendations. There are several fine utilities that can perform these functions, but several that I have been using recently come from the historical city of Dunkerque, France, courtesy of their publisher CPUID Software.

CPUID software is best known for its namesake product, CPUID, which is as it says, a utility to identify the details of the CPU chip installed in a computer. This is often necessary to know if the computer is being benchmarked (performance measured), upgraded, or undergoing major repairs. The latest CPUID software is named CPU-Z, version 1.55. This small utility displays the processor brand and model number, the type of socket it uses (necessary to know for replacement or upgrades), speeds, and other details about the CPU chip, which is the central "brains" of the computer. Sometimes it is desirable or necessary to replace a motherboard, or determine the BIOS on the motherboard.

The motherboard is the central platform on which most of the other internal components are either directly attached to, or otherwise connected to, and provides much of the internal communication between the components. While generally very reliable and long lived, sometimes it is necessary to replace a motherboard.

The BIOS, an acronym for "Basic Input - Output System" is typically attached to the motherboard, and contains the first code run by a PC when it is initially powered on. The BIOS identifies and initializes the video card, keyboard, mouse, hard drive, CD/DVD drive, and other key components. The BIOS contains software in a non-volatile ROM chip, and is typically firmly attached to the motherboard. Most BIOS chips can be updated and upgraded with software provided either by the BIOS manufacturer, motherboard maker, or computer manufacturer.

CPU-Z identifies the brand of BIOS, the version of its software, and the date of the software stored in it. With this information, it is somewhat easy to determine if the BIOS contains the latest software. Keeping the BIOS updated is not a critical task if everything appears to be working OK, but for those of us always trying to tweak

our computers and capitalize in the latest offerings, this is good information to have.

One warning is appropriate here; if the user is considering updating the BIOS, be absolutely sure to explicitly follow the manufacturer's directions to the letter! In a worst case scenario, failure to do so will result in an expensive paperweight, but in many cases, there is a procedure to "roll back" or restore the BIOS to its earlier status.

When I ask people how much memory they have in their computer, they are often clueless, or erroneously confuse the memory with the storage capacity of their hard drives. Clicking on the "Memory" tab of CPU-Z displays the type of memory, the amount of memory, speed, and other characteristics. The "SPD" tap allows the user to cycle through the memory stick installed in his computer, displaying the capacity of each stick, the type, manufacturer, part number, and other information. This information may be necessary if the user wants to add or replace memory in the computer.

The "Graphics" tab displays information about the display device, including the brand, model number, chipset, speed, and memory. Since the video card makers often release updates, enhancements, and new features, this information could be very useful.

CPUID also publishes several other utilities, and another one that I found useful is PC Wizard 2010. PC Wizard was first published in 1996, and is considered one of the most comprehensive system information utilities available. Since the hardware industry is very dynamic, with new hardware being introduced on a daily basis, PC Wizard is frequently updated, typically monthly. In addition to identifying and displaying the details of the hardware and software on the computer, PC Wizard can also benchmark the performance of the individual computer components, as well as the entire computer. By noting which

components and software are the performance laggards, the user can then determine what, if any, practical solutions may improve performance.

PC Wizard utilizes a series of icons representing each of the components or software titles installed on the computer, and can determine the hardware, configuration, system files, and resources used by the computer. The benchmark selection can test and display the performance of the entire computer, the CPU (processor chip), memory, video, hard drive, external storage devices (like CD/DVD and USB drives), and other hardware components. In addition to displaying the performance of the hardware itself, a "Compare Results" shows how the user's computer compares to others. The results are also displayed and announced (audio) using the wizard avatar and voice synthesis similar to the "Vox Proxy" PowerPoint accessory. PC Wizard provides the user with a wealth of information.

While CPUID has several utilities available for free download, one of those that I also found very useful is HWMonitor, which is a shortened "Hardware Monitor". This utility is also available in an enhanced commercial version, HWMonitor Pro, which adds additional features and functionality. HWMonitor (the free version) can identify the power supply in the computer, and display the real-time voltages, temperatures, and fans in the power supply. This is important to monitor the health of the power supply, and consider a replacement or upgrade if necessary. Many users are unaware that their computers report the temperatures of various components in the computer, which is important in that heat is one of the big killers of components.

Being somewhat colonial, I selected to display the temperatures in Fahrenheit (F) rather than Celsius (C). Usually there are some fans in each computer which are critical in exhausting the heat from the components, and bring

in cool outside air. HWMonitor tracks and reports the performance of the fans, which can enable the user to easily and quickly see if a fan is failing; a dead fan can lead to overheating and damage or destruction of the computer's components. This utility can also track and report on the temperatures of the motherboard, CPU chip, video card, and hard drive.

Most of these utilities are available for 32 and 64 bit Windows PCs using recent versions of Windows such as XP, Vista, and Windows 7, although some of the utilities also have builds that are explicitly for Windows 98. The files are relatively small and fast to download, and consume minimal system resources, such that they do not noticeably degrade system performance. These utilities could be a useful asset to anyone who wants to keep up with the performance, condition, and health of his system.

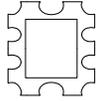


