HOW TO RESET A TOUCHPAD TO DEFAULT SETTINGS IN WINDOWS 10 – If you accidentally change a touchpad setting, if your touchpad is acting up, or if you want a fresh start without customizations, you can reset your touchpad settings to the default in Windows 10.

Most laptops these days come with touchpads that do a lot more than click and scroll. They incorporate two, three, and even four-finger gestures to help navigate your Windows machine with ease. You can assign those gestures to features that open up Cortana, switch between active windows, and open your action center. In addition, you're able to change the scroll sensitivity or whether or not to disable the touchpad when you connect an external mouse. If you've done a bunch of customizing and want to start over, or if you're experiencing trouble, resetting to the default options can help.

5 WAYS TO REDUCE YOUR OUTLOOK MAILBOX SIZE – Is your mailbox full? Are you getting weekly or even daily messages from your system administrator saying you need to reduce the Microsoft Outlook mailbox size? This can lead to a lot of wasted time cleaning up your mailbox. Try these tips for a faster, more organized approach to keep your mailbox smaller and easier to work with.

Note: Although these techniques are most valuable to Outlook users running under Microsoft Exchange (including Office 365), you can still cleanup your Outlook mailbox size if you are running Outlook as a stand-alone (POP3) version. Reducing the size often improves performance.

Caution: Before starting these steps, take the time to back up your Outlook.pst file (stand-alone version) which is usually found under the Outlook Files folder in Documents.

The goal of Google Tasks historically has been to keep you organized with your to-dos. Adding tasks and managing lists are easy with this new task management app.

While it doesn't rival the feature-rich Todoist, the minimalism of Google Tasks is being praised for its basic abilities.

Since the days of the old Google Tasks, Google has stepped things up. Eight years on, they've created something quite interesting.

The goal of the classic Google Tasks was to help organize tasks when inside your Gmail account. You could access the task list from the inbox and stay on top of your to-dos. The design was never award-winning. But Google never put their full attention on upgrading this.

CATS relayed a local announcement of "Semi Free Wi-Fi": The Anne Arundel County Public Library is now lending out, for people with AACPL Library Card or Anne Arundel County Student SAIL ID account, a Wi-Fi device based on Sprint's Cell Network. You do not need an Internet Provider Account. Libraries often offer technology training, consulting, and other resources -- so stay in touch with your local library system, ensure that members know what's available and explore partnering opportunities for your group to help serve your community.

A meeting highlighted how to backup Android smartphone data. The agenda noted that Calendar, Contacts, Pictures, Photos, Video, and text messages on Android Smartphones can be backed up and synced to a Google Account -- so if you lose your phone, buy a new phone, drop your phone in a river, or must do a factory reset to original condition, everything can be restored to a new phone or after a factory reset. If you do not want Google to have this information, then much of this data can be moved to a PC.

FPCUG held their annual appreciation dinner at the local Red Lobster restaurant, hosting members and their guests.

Several workshops met: Windows 10, Experimac (covering Apple iPhone and iPad basics), and Windows All (describing configuring computers for faster operation). One Experimac session revolved around phone photography, using the built-in camera to edit photos and demonstrate other apps. And, of course, it emphasized ensuring to back up photos taken.

Serving the Rappahannock area for over five decades, MHAF improves lives of people with mental health problems by providing advocacy, education and services that improve access to quality mental health treatment and services, particularly for vulnerable populations.

Highlights from a Lifetime of Forecasting, Finding and Photographing Tornadoes - David Hoadley, veteran storm chaser, presented some of his tornado photography and talked about how he began this hobby 62 years ago in Bismarck, North Dakota. He briefly explained how he got started, made early forecasts and chases, discussed and showed several tornado intercepts and their damage, illustrated one close call when he and his daughter dove for a ditch, discussed commercially available chase tours, and summarized how this hobby has grown and evolved over the years. He also used a few props, including a vintage 8mm, hand-crank movie camera and old facsimile Weather Bureau maps. David covered a lot of material but left time at the end for questions. Hoadley has pursued tornadic thunderstorms for the past 62 years, across the Great Plains and east coast of the United States. Fellow enthusiasts believe him to be the first "storm chaser" -- someone who prepares his own forecasts and travels interstate to pursue them.

The World's Largest Digital Photo Frames was presented by John Krout. In the late 2000s, the presenter used a number of digital photo frames from various makers, including Sony, and each failed within about 18 months of purchase. Frustrated with both that brief lifespan and photo frame resolution far less than the resolution of photos from his cameras, he set out to find a digital photo frame with three specific requirements: higher resolution, longer lifespan, and lower price. He found it! Using only items that you likely have on hand at home already, he was able to display a repeating slide show of hundreds of digital photos at 2-megapixel resolution. In 2016, he upgraded to 8-megapixel resolution.

An Afternoon Learners SIG featured around the room introductions and chat with Digital Media Professional Alexis Weathers, who talked about her work in website building, video editing, email marketing and social media. Her LinkedIn profile features the slogan, "Digital media therapy for your growing business needs."

Since this was the day after Apple's September reveal, time was spent unpacking it; two short clips were played talking about the new hardware.

People also talked about the move to #bezelless - where the screen goes right to the edge of the phone - it was observed that this is future looking - once accustomed to it, we won't want to go back.

The group also viewed an updated "Media Bias" chart -- a good one to keep in mind as we continually try to find common themes with people who have different viewpoints!

pause to take questions, replay something for discussion. Videos are available on YouTube and use "CNN" layout for split-screen Q&A.

The Pi is fortunate that its frequent meeting site, George Mason University, features blindingly fast Internet connection.

The Pi is imaging old journals for member reference and always beginning meetings with engaging/informative Q&A.

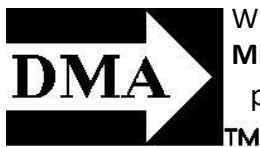

Kentucky-Indiana PC User Group shared with its members how to be more secure creating and using “non-administrator” accounts in their daily computer use in Windows 10. They also had an informative program on what the current “Tech Trends” are that their members should know about.

Columbus Computer Society encourages its members to not use the “single password method” or the “easy to remember password method” and had a program on using a Password Manager to create and store all their passwords in an easy to access method.





With so many club members taking pictures and videos over the summer, the **Dayton Microcomputer Assn.** offered their members some instruction on digital imaging with a program on the Microsoft Photo app and the Movie Editor app.

The newest trend in printing is the 3-D printer process. With the size and price of this new liquid printing system coming down to what a home computer user can afford, the

SouthEastern Michigan Computer Organization gave their members a look at how 3-D printers work. They also had a program demonstrating the tiny, fit in your pocket, computer called a Raspberry Pi. This little device has the same power and abilities as some much larger laptops, and the cost is very small.



Solon Senior Center Tech-Talk had a very informative program where they found out about what “social media” resources they had in their local area. We all know about Facebook, Twitter, and the other “worldwide” services, but they found out they had a lot of social access to local area information. You might be surprised at what you might have in your own area.



Sterling Heights Computer Club took a walk in someone else’s shoes. Most of the time we look at Amazon as the buyer of products. But have you ever thought of what it’s like being the seller? Their program had someone tell what it’s like on the other side of the screen when you are trying to get someone to buy your product.

First it was the heavy-duty video camera that you rested on your shoulder to take those home movies, then things got smaller and smaller. Next, we moved to the video camera in smartphones and we all started taking those family videos and moved to capturing “events” taking place in front of our eyes. **Plateau PC Users Group** learned about the newest trend of installing “Dash Cams” in cars that take the videos of how things are as you travel down the road. They had a combined program on dash cams and the options we have with GPS.

Should I Buy a Chromebook – October

Chromebooks are a simpler alternative way to use computers. A Chromebook is a laptop that uses Google’s Chrome operating system instead of Windows 10. Chromebooks can do anything on the web that you can do using a PC browser. You can get your email, visit websites, create documents and spreadsheets, print, play games, do your banking, keep your calendar, watch movies and do all this in on a secure computer with a simpler and more straightforward interface than Windows 10. For most seniors, a Chromebook has the capacity to do anything that we want it to do. Chromebooks are less expensive than PCs with some available for around \$200. The Computer Club of Hot Springs Village has started a new SIG – HSV Drone Pilots. The purpose of the SIG is to discuss where to buy and where to fly. As you are asking how Drones fit in with computers, you will discover there are several skills that can be taken back. Drones contain cameras that require some knowledge of how to get information from one device to another. Drones also incorporate the use of Wi-Fi and Bluetooth. One of the other offerings they have posted on their website is what they call Drop-in Help. They offer this SIG three times a month and try to help members and non-members with any computer-related problem. They only ask that the member or non-member e-mail their questions in advance. They have a Mobile Device User Group that includes Kindle Fire, iPads and iPhones, and Android cell phones and tablets. They provide information as well as hands on help to better assist their members and to help them get the most from their gadgets. Many seniors are getting or would like to get better phones, tablets and other devices that are internet connected. All they need is a place to provide help and support. What better place is your computer club?

Other clubs within Region 8, for example the Cajun Clickers in Baton Rouge, offer workshops to their members on everything from Using Smartphones to Using Gmail and iCloud. As you are reading this, the question that always comes up is who we will get to engage to lead or instruct. Many people have a false impression that they have to be an expert or a computer guru in order to teach or lead. That is not the case, all that is needed is a curiosity and an interest. It is worth exploring and asking those questions in your board meetings. Also, you have to have something of interest for the community to come to you. There are many topics that should spike some conversation: using your smartphone for other things than making phone calls, voice recognition devices such as Google Home, Alexa, and HomePod among others are gaining momentum. Many of the devices may find themselves in your members' homes.

As your Region 8 advisor, I am always available to provide interactive webinar presentation on any number of subjects that are available in the APCUG Speakers Bureau. It's a dangerous world out there on the Internet. Attendees will learn how to protect themselves. This seminar describes how senior Nevada residents (age 65 and older) can notify the four major credit monitoring agencies (Equifax, Experian, TransUnion and Innovis) to place a Security Credit Freeze on their accounts for free. When you place a credit freeze on your credit report, you are telling the credit bureau not to release your credit report in situations where creditors are trying to open new credit accounts in your name. Attendees will also learn how to stop pre-approved credit offers through the mail as well as how to stop or limit the junk mail they receive.

Also, this month, there will be a workshop on *Windows 10 Has More Than Two Dozen Ways to Annoy You - this Presentation Will Show How to Eliminate Them*. From the get-go, Windows 10 starts as a very annoying operating system. The Start menu is full of useless apps that you will probably never use, advertisements are littered all over the place, and strange icons clutter the taskbar. Attendees will learn, "step-by-step," how to remove these and many other frustrations and by doing so speed up their computer.

They also had a short chat about Charity Navigator (www.charitynavigator.org). This site rates thousands of charities on their efficiency in soliciting donations and the output to those programs. Many in the group talked about the number of solicitations received in the mail, on a daily basis, and the discarding of them. Once you donate to a charity, the collection agency sells your address to like-minded charities. So, for example, if you donate to a no-kill animal shelter you will receive mail from many other shelters asking for your money. Charity Navigator rates all charities that have assets of \$1 million or more and awards them zero to 4 stars. You might be surprised at the more popular ones that have only 2 or 3 stars.

A member also talked about changes to his security settings that were made by the August 2018 Windows 10 Update. Apparently, settings that were set by him had been changed and suddenly he had new default settings. Needless to say, this caused him some concern and he wanted to alert us to see if anyone else had their settings changed. We figured most of us never bothered to look at any of the security settings after an update and just kept innocently plugging right along.

Their October meeting was one of Bob Gostischa's 26 presentations he gave during National Cybersecurity Awareness Month. Don't have Wi-Fi or it's not reliable? use a hot spot like this group did.

Artificial Intelligence (AI) and deep learning; and *The Windows Journey to 1803 - Generations, Editions and Versions*.

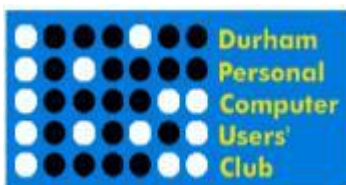

USER GROUP TIPS

Free Publicity Beats Paying for Advertising!

Here's my County's seniors-oriented publication <https://tinyurl.com/yazh4f3o>. Pages 9/10 feature an article I wrote about the Washington, DC area's two main consumer-oriented user groups: Washington Apple Pi (WAP -- www.wap.org) and Potomac Area Computers and Technology Society (PATACS -- www.patacs.org). It remains to be seen how many inquiries/visitors/members it will generate -- but it's new exposure for both groups in this publication, so it can't hurt. You will also find the article featured in Member News on apcug2.org.

Most areas have similar publications, whether they're government-produced, neighborhood-oriented, or even paid circulation -- and such publications always need material, especially that for which they needn't pay. Look around, collect information on your and any other such community-serving organizations, and get it in print!

Recruit User Group Presentations by Users!

Over the last year I've given demonstrations/presentations to the smaller of PATACS meetings, covering favorite Windows programs/tools: CaptureWizPro <http://pixelmetrics.com/CapWizPro/>, FileLocator Pro <https://www.mythicsoft.com/filelocatorpro/>, Norton Security <https://us.norton.com/norton-security-antivirus>, Tornado File Transfer <https://www.amazon.com/Tornado-Data-Transfer-Device-Cable/dp/B000YEQG0U>, and WinDirStat <https://windirstat.net/>. Since I use all these programs, the presentations took less than an hour to prepare. They mix a few PowerPoint slides, a tour through the vendor's website, and demonstration of the tool with discussion of functions/options/features. It's likely that everyone reading this uses some number of similar products -- and the same goes for most people at meetings. With a little effort and preparation there should be an abundant supply of meeting presentations. They needn't be elaborate to be effective -- often a description alone is enough motivation for people to investigate further. User groups used to feature member presentations -- it's a worthwhile tradition to rejuvenate!

And If That Fails...

I'm more than halfway serious about this: put names of everyone at a meeting in a hat, draw one, and designate that person as the following month's demonstrator/speaker. After someone speaks, don't enter their name for six months. EVERYONE has something they can present, even if it's commonly used -- individual perspective is valuable and will give other members insights.

What's Members-Only? What's Public? Why? (Do you know?)

Across groups there's tremendous variation in private-vs.-public material, and yet every group is sure that their blend is optimal. In fact, as mostly a bystander to these decisions, it appears that what's done is done because that's how it's always been done.

I'm not convinced that most people join groups because that gives access to online newsletters, or group discussions, or historical photos, or anything in particular. Rather, I think members seek to be part of a community and support group overall missions. Even more important, I'm convinced that more resources available publicly makes member recruiting more effective.

It's instructive occasionally ASKING members why they joined and remain, and whether access to particular material was critical to the decision. As an active recruiter for WAP/Pi, I always have the groups' trifold brochures and newsletters with me. Being able to simply give people content-rich URLs to visit is another way to provide information.

A Couple of Hot Buttons of Mine

I counsel (suggest/nag/harangue) groups about needing new people volunteering and as board members/officers.

I counsel (suggest/nag/harangue) groups about needing full information (group name, meeting time, etc.) on websites and in EVERY email.

Free is Good but Discounts Aren't Bad

I've arranged discounts (20%, 33%, 50%!) on products I recently demonstrated, plus one new to me, which I quite liked; these will be announced through APCUG one-at-a-time. Getting these discounts wasn't hard -- I simply introduced APCUG, described our member groups with collective large membership, and suggested that a discount in exchange for reaching such a large audience would be a good deal. Bingo. If you have favorite products or come across something new which might appeal to APCUG group members -- see what the vendor will offer. Let Judy Tylour know so she can push the information to groups.

Technology Stores are a Natural Resource for User Groups

The manager of my local Micro Center store and I met and discussed cooperation with Pi/PATACS. He was charming, delighted, and open to all sorts of cooperation/collaboration. When his store finishes renovating their training room, we'll explore group meetings there, member discounts, and store staff presentations at regular meetings. If you have nearby stores -- large or small, chain or local -- let managers/owners know about your group and explore whether they can let customers know about your group. In exchange, you can list store events in group material. User groups and stores are hardly competitors -- in fact, your offerings are complementary.

Apples Enhance a Healthy User Community Diet

Over the last few years I've gotten to know and enjoy the DC area's Apple user group, Washington Apple Pi ("The Pi", or WAP). Why? Because about six years ago I bought an iPad and more recently added an iPhone to the family. In spite of my foreign (to them!) background, I was welcomed. I've learned a great deal from Apple technology experts (including Apple representatives); I was happy to welcome WAP to APCUG membership, and I recently spoke at WAP on my iPad/iPhone experiences. We've had multiple informal exchange visits between members of WAP and those in my home group PATACS; there's clear recognition that borders between technology user camps are fuzzy, if they exist at all: many Windows users have Apple devices, websites are platform- and browser-agnostic, the cloud hovers over everyone, smartphone apps and tips usually apply across brands, etc. Look around for nearby Apple groups/clubs/organizations -- even Apple stores! -- with which your group might share interests/opportunities. Your members might benefit from participating in them, and you might recruit Apple-oriented members who support friends' and relatives' use of Windows technology.

If malls want to thrive, they must do things to drive people in and make it an experience. Their mission is to stay relevant. As e-commerce attracts more of the shopper's dollars, traditional malls are doing quite a bit of soul-searching. They wonder how they can continue to keep shoppers happy in an era when customers have gotten used to the highly personalized and convenient experience of online shopping.

The newly successful malls are focused on convenience and efficiency from big decisions such as store location to little details such as what kind of furniture to use. These malls are full of little neighborhoods of like stores so that shoppers can get all their favorite outposts quickly and easily. Amenities such as children's playgrounds and family bathrooms are also designated this way. We are seeing the food court disappearing and being replaced by the dining terrace, designated to be a place where you might use your laptop or linger with friends. Fast casual restaurants have opened. Set ups like this will encourage consumers to think of the mall is not just a shopping center but as a community hang out.

There has been a change in the mix of stores. These new formats can include movie theaters, fitness centers, educational facilities, walk-in medical clinics, health and wellness centers, and even supermarkets, that were some of the original anchors in the malls predating the 1980s. These reinvented malls are leveraging technology. Many offer free Wi-Fi. In others, retailers use apps to encourage shoppers or to send shopper location-based offers as they shop. Some have in-store GPS to help shoppers look for a particular department or store. They try to make the experience memorable and schedule events such as fashion shows, auto shows, technology exhibitions, and special holiday events to enhance the draw of the mall.

The mall in Sarasota has a Facebook page, special offers, free Wi-Fi, and special apps with offers. An app called "Step Away" has exclusive sales and deals while shopping. There are special shopping packages with local hotels. There are group specials. There are locally themed children's play areas. There are couches with electrical outlets and USB ports to allow customers to charge cell phones, tablets and other devices.

Let's shift to user groups. Many computer user groups organized in the 80's & 90's. Many operate just as they did then. Of course, it is more difficult to get speakers, free programs, and volunteers to run meetings and SIGs. Many user groups have folded or are close to folding. Some groups are thriving. Those that are thriving have reinvented themselves. See the similarities to shopping malls?

Look at what has changed since your user group first organized. Very few people had computers. It was difficult to find help. Now, most homes have at least one computer, most have several. When our groups started, there was no Internet. Many groups started a BBS and had a newsletter to help their members. Presenters travelled and gave great presentations with giveaways.

However, new technology came. Many of our group leaders did not want to learn or change with the times. When your group started, there was no YouTube. There are now over 1 billion YouTube users and

over 4 billion video views per day. There were no iPhones or Smartphones back in the day. There have been close to 800 million iPhones sold and over 200 million iPads. There has been 1 billion smartphones sold and tablets are selling at a rate of about 275 million a year. Not counting cameras in phones, 2.5 billion people have digital cameras and the first digital camera was sold just 30 years ago.

Other technologies have come about in recent years. Skype launched in 2002 and has 300 million users. Instagram has 182.5 million users who share 19 billion photos, with 58 million photos being uploaded daily. Facebook has 1.4 billion users and increased 12% last year. Twitter has over 1 billion registered users, with over 300 million monthly active users. Other widely used new technologies include, but not limited to Roku, Apple TV, HDTV, & 4K TV. More recently, Uber now has over 8 million users and 160,000 drivers.

Has your user group become one of the old, tired shopping malls? Has it reinvented itself to highlight the newer technologies, some of which I have mentioned? If your group has not changed with the times, it is lot like the old dead malls and probably will be torn down soon. If your group has changed the topics, changed the way you present, promoted your group to new people, and accepted these new visitors or members and their focus, then your group is like the thriving malls. It may not be too late to change & update, but it does take some work. It also takes publicity in new and different ways.

Publicity needs to be a combination of many aspects such as a fresh website, which is kept up to date. Your group should have a Facebook page which items are posted regularly. Other ways to publicize your group include Meetup.com, a newsletter, eNews via an email newsletter/flyer, etc. Use the many benefits of APCUG to get more ideas.
