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With the 2023 Dues Renewal completed, some of our member clubs have made the difficult decision to disband. Same reasons as in the past – too few members willing to take on the responsibilities of running a computer club, and the ones who have been doing the lion's share reaching the point of exhaustion. Living through the Covid epidemic obviously did not help.

Two main changes helped my small Club in Arizona. First, we became a Meet-Up club with no officers, dues, or members. Instead, we have attendees. Second, we stopped meeting in person, which eliminated the work involved with setting up and tearing down equipment and coordination with the folks that managed the room where we held our in-person meetings.

Our monthly meetings are now held via Zoom, with me doing all the work. But it is much less than I had before when we met in person. I put together the agenda. Sometimes someone from the APCUG Speakers Bureau makes a presentation; other times, I'll show a YouTube video on technology that I think is appropriate for the topic we are discussing. On occasion, other attendees will share their screen and talk about a bit of technology that is interesting to them.

The meeting starts 30 minutes before its official start time for what I call "social time," so those in attendance can still talk with longtime friends. The official meetings often begin with what I call "Show and Tell," where attendees can talk about a new computer or another device they recently acquired.

Since we now meet via Zoom, I sold the Club's old projector for \$100, which gives us two more years of APCUG membership.

I mention this because I don't want to see any more clubs making the difficult decision to close their doors before they've explored other alternatives. If you need my guidance along these lines as to what I did to keep my Club going, feel free to contact me at rbaxter@apcug.org

Although many know that Lancaster County is home to many Amish and Mennonites and that there are beautiful farms and rolling hills here, few know that before Covid, Lancaster County had about 11 million visitors each year. Even fewer know that the county has many retirement communities.

Willow Valley Communities has approximately 2,700 residents and 1,500 team members. Residents are 55 and older.

Our Club members are residents and team members of Willow Valley Communities. We have 854 members and are continuing to grow.

The Club's interests span Android, Apple, Linux, and Windows. We would also work with other types of computers if our members were interested.

We have monthly meetings and publish a monthly newsletter. We do not meet or publish in July and August. Topics of general interest are presented at our monthly meetings

From staying connected with loved ones to managing finances and health, smartphones, and computers offer numerous opportunities to remain independent and engaged. This includes access to online shopping, telemedicine, and video conferencing. The use of technology can also improve mental stimulation and reduce feelings of loneliness.

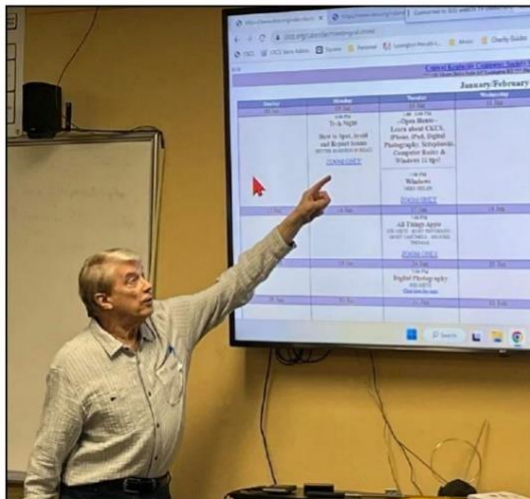
Has Open House for Members and Guests

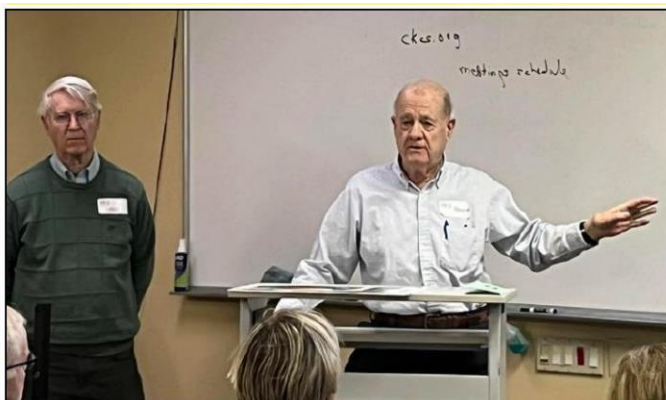
The Crowd

Access-VBA: Database normalization, combo, and list boxes.

Linux User Group: Linuxfx, which, according to distrowatch.com, is "a Brazilian Linux distribution based on Ubuntu. It ships with an intuitive Cinnamon desktop user interface designed to facilitate the migration of users from Windows." Lee Maxwell: Explores KDE Plasma desktop environment. Also, discussion of the inxi graphics driver in Linux Mint.

A Zoom meeting was particularly interesting and useful since it was hosted by the Washington Apple Pi (WAP). Participants were invited to ask expert WAP members WAP how to solve a problem or resolve issues. It was a fully interactive adventure, and there was much learned.

WAP hosted this as an experimental outreach program to assist groups such as LWApple, as well as an experiment for LWApple. Response and attendance seemed positive, so meeting with WAP may be the model for future meetings.

The year 2023 will see changes in the tech world. To start the year, we are seeing tech companies making huge layoffs. I wonder if that is due to a slowdown in tech development, or have we become so saturated with new stuff that it is time to slow the train down? Just questions, but no answers. The tech companies are stated that they are just purging their low-performing employees. However, there are other underlying concerns which point to inflation, slow economic growth, and a possible recession next year. It's worth noting that layoffs are a common business practice, and not all tech companies are having massive layoffs at the same time. It's also important to look at the specific reasons that the company is citing for its layoffs, as they can vary.

With all of that said, 2023 does seem to be a year for new and innovative technology. The artificial intelligence (AI) world is beginning to explode, with new applications being developed and applied to everyday tasks. All the buzz is about ChatGPT. It's a tool being developed by OpenAI for natural language processing and can be used in a wide range of applications, including chatbots, virtual assistants, and automated content generation. GPT means Generative Pre-training Transformer. It is in beta, but it has been hitting all the news agencies with Pros and Cons on its ability. You will read that because of its journalism, it will die. Plagiarism will become the norm, etc. The naysayer rather than viewing this as a tool like the typewriter replacing pens and notebooks, which somehow the typewriter takes the romanticism out of writing. It seems to me that ChatGPT is just a tool that will create better writers. The human element is needed to formulate and develop ideas and be the creator. What are your thoughts on artificial intelligence. It seems to me that this would make a great meeting topic.

Good computer meeting topics are what brings back and keeps your members. It can be a challenge, but if your Program director is aware and uses the APCUG Speaker Bureau, he or she will find many good meeting ideas. You can also use the Speaker Bureau as a springboard to create your own meeting if you prefer to have an in-person meeting. Another resource to do that is review the APCUG YouTube channel using the YouTube presentation as a model.

When choosing topics for a computer meeting, it's important to consider the goals and objectives of the meeting, as well as the audience that will be attending. Key considerations would include:

- **Relevance:** Make sure the topics being discussed are directly related to the goals of the meeting and the needs of the attendees.
- **Timeliness:** Choose topics that are current and relevant to the industry or field in question.
- **Interest:** Select topics that are likely to be of interest to the attendees and that will engage them in the discussion.

- Expertise: Consider the level of expertise of the attendees and choose topics that are appropriate for their skill level.
- Action: Ensure the topics chosen will lead to actionable outcomes.

It's also a good idea to gather input from attendees or stakeholders on potential topics to ensure they are on the same page and that the meeting will be productive and valuable for all parties involved.

What are your plans to keep your club viable for 2023? As a club board member, you need to keep your membership in mind. There are several key factors that can help keep a computer club relevant:

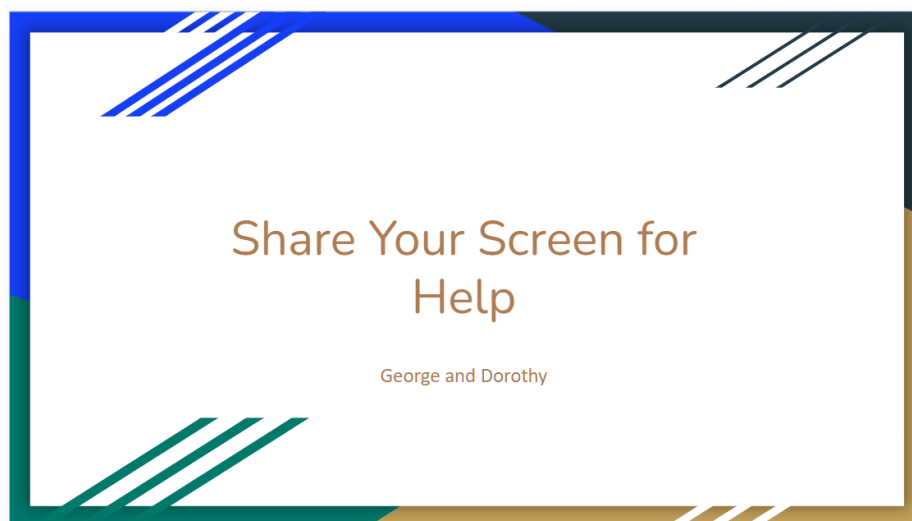

Protect Important Club Resources and Assets

It's unpleasant to consider, but occasionally people in non-profit organizations help themselves to things (equipment, money, etc.) the organization owns. Washington Post article <https://tinyurl.com/yr75fb47> notes, "Billions flow through youth sports. And some of it keeps disappearing. In cities across the U.S., allegations of financial misconduct divide non-profit clubs and communities." And sometimes a project earning money for a non-profit cause -- e.g., a user group's computer refurbishing/recycling -- is too tempting to resist.

So, it's worth striking a balance between being too relaxed and trusting, and being so constrained as to prevent worthwhile things from being done or driving away goodhearted volunteers. That is, separating responsibilities (one person handles records, another handles funds); requiring two signatures on checks; conducting periodic audits by people not involved in handling records/funds. It won't connote distrust -- it's simply a good business practice, even for small non-profit organizations.

One Person's Clutter Can Be Another's Treasure

Two recent personal exchanges reminded me why the Internet, even with its wealth of information and communities, will never replace face-to-face activities. First, I recently griped to one of the two DC-area groups to which I belong, about my problematic Dell all-in-one printer/scanner/FAX. A colleague responded that he had an identical device and might be able to help me. I was surprised when he arrived WITH it. He's inherited it from his father, he said, and it took up space in his garage that he was happy to free up. So, we installed it, tested it, verified it worked, and off he went. At my leisure, I'll work on my original printer to see if it can be rejuvenated.

The second was similar -- when I recently replaced my iPhone 6s with an iPhone 14 Pro, I unhappily discovered that Apple would no longer give even a pittance in trade-in. So, I asked around for someone who might be able to use it. Another colleague from the same group asked for it, saying that it was a nice upgrade from his iPhone 6, which would allow him to upgrade from iOS 12 to 16. I included the nice belt/hip case I had for the phone, because (of course) the iPhone 14 Pro was a slightly different size so needed a new one.

Checklists Avoid the Not-Good Sort of Surprise

In the process of helping a non-technical group adapt to running hybrid meetings (that is, attendees both in-room and online remote, and speakers either in-room or remote) I drafted two checklists: one for pre-meeting preparation (e.g., receiving speaker biography and presentation title/description, learning speaker requirements and planned handouts, explaining meeting technology to speaker, publicizing meeting), and the other for meeting setup (tables/chairs, podium, refreshments, Internet connectivity, projection facilities). A wonderful book written by a doctor, *The Checklist Manifesto* <<https://www.amazon.com/Checklist-Manifesto-How-Things-Right/dp/0312430000>> explains how simple checklists changed the outcome of surgeries. They're equally valuable for user groups.

Captions Can Enhance the Value of YouTube Videos

YouTube is a great source of diverse videos for use as meeting programs or individual viewing. Explore APCUG's YouTube channel for a selection <<https://www.youtube.com/user/APCUGVideos/videos>> adding topic keywords to locate specific material of interest, e.g., "Windows 10", membership, or fundraising.

But video sound quality varies, depending both on recording quality and the sound system used. It's easy to enable captions tracking what's said: move the mouse cursor over the video display and click CC (Closed Captions) icon in screen lower-right corner.

Is There a Senior Residence Community Near You?

Increasingly, activity-rich senior residence communities have technology clubs. But, especially when they're first organized, they may struggle to assemble a critical mass of volunteers, speakers, topics, and meeting savvy. A specialized group I'm familiar with merged into a much larger technology-diverse activity in its community and has partnered with two external groups for meeting content -- one being Apple-focused and the other targeting all things tech. This is win/win/win -- the community tech activity greatly expanded resources for residents, and the two outside groups gained significant outreach to many potential new members.

Be Alert for Local Speaker Prospects and Reach Out to Them

I help my two local groups -- www.wap.org and www.patacs.org -- recruit speakers. When I see someone we might book for a presentation -- mentioned in a neighborhood or regional publication, advertising technology services, highlighted at a meeting I attend -- I reach out, introduce myself and describe the two groups, and ask if they might present. More often than not, they're interested, willing, and available. I introduce them to the people who book speakers, and note the introduction in a spreadsheet -- so I can follow up and ensure we don't lose track of them.

I'm always on the lookout -- perhaps the most interesting introduction I've made was based on my parking behind a car that sprouted a VERY unlikely number of antennas. I know what unmarked police cars look like and this clearly was not one. Coincidentally, while I was admiring the car, a fellow walked up to get in. I told him I was intrigued by his futuristic ride and asked about it. He works for a local government contractor, doing research into autonomous vehicles and smart roadways. Bingo -- that's a presentation.
