Ch, Ch, Ch, Ch, Changes...

Most companies, organizations, publications, software packages, and people need changes from time to time. The SHCC is about to have some subtle changes in the near future. The officers spent much of this month's officer meeting discussing the future of the SHCC. I want to use this column to introduce you to some of the changes the officers have outlined for the future. I'll start out with some of the more immediate changes followed by some longer range plans.

The first change is the regular meeting format. For years we have started the meeting with 15 minutes of business, followed by 15 minutes of Q&A, followed by our main presentation for an hour or so. The meeting has wrapped up with door prizes and final

announcements. Many people have questioned the value of Q&A recently, and wondered if most of the questions should be taken off-line. I feel it is an important part of the meeting. The officers think a change is needed so the new meeting format will be business, followed by the meeting presentation, door prizes and Q&A at the end. This may be ideal since many people stay after the meeting to discuss Q&A in an unofficial capacity. The business part of the meeting will be shortened as much as possible so pay attention to the newsletter for club information. Several members like to come early to the meeting to discuss various computer (and non-computer) topics. I find this very beneficial like many others. This will **not** be changed.

The officers are very interested in raising the membership back to levels over 100. Several ideas were discussed to get more members. A new policy was formed that provides current members incentive to get others to join the club. Any member that gets a person who was not previously a member to join the SHCC will

have their membership extended by three months. The extension will be made for each person they get to join and this policy takes affect April 16, 1996. Therefore you can get a free year of membership for every 4 people you bring in as members to the SHCC. The officers will also be contacting people who were members and inviting them to see what is going on here at the SHCC.

On a related issue, I want to thank Lindell Beck for volunteering as our greeter person. This is a very important part of raising our membership. Lindell (and all other members) should help newcomers find out what is beneficial about the SHCC. Thanks Lindell!

The shareware disk library is not used at all. There are several reasons, the main being that commercial grade software is very affordable. Because the interest is zero we have put the disk library "on hiatus". The club is retaining the assets (disks and disk containers) in case it returns in the future. This also means that the disk of the month (which has not been around for nearly a year) is also officially "on hiatus".

We need to get our WYSIWYG

Gazette "Special Edition" out into the different stores. If you are interested in regularly dropping off some of these issues at the different store let me know. Rick Kucejko updates this advertisement once a quarter or so when it needs updating.

Now lets get to the long term issues...

The officers would like to see the newsletter get a face-lift. The format has been the same for quite a long time. I have asked Rick Kucejko to check into the effort involved. He is very interested and will be making some small changes over the next few months and a complete face-lift for the September newsletter. I feel we have a very good newsletter, but there is room for improvement. I would also like to see more people write for the newsletter. We now have regulars Jim Waldrop contributing the incoming press releases, John Herberg editing "Ask the Expert", Rick Kucejko providing reviews and how people use computers (along with the publishing), and myself with various editorials, reviews, and tips. This newsletter would be much better if others contributed from time to time.

smaller than the original document file. The saved version also had the Envoy program, as well as its help files. Further compression in the .ZIP format did not result in much more compression of the ENVOY created file.

I tried sending the Envoy saved WYSIWYG file through cyberspace. I was successful sending the files over the Internet as a "file attachment", using NETSCAPE, both to myself and others. I was not able to send the files through Prodigy or CompuServe. In Prodigy, the file was broken into several parts. In CompuServe, it was distorted. There may be solutions to these problems, but I don't know what they are at this time. The WYSIWYG file I used for e-mail testing was about 1 MB. It took about 10 minutes to send at a 14.4 baud rate.

The ENVOY program worked well, and was easy to use. After solving the installation problem I encountered, the program was relatively self explanatory. The documentation was only a 6 page procure, beyond the online help files. This was adequate.

I have upgraded to Windows95 since originally

To save a document file in the Envoy program format, you need to do the following:

- 1 Open, or create the document in the program used to make it.
- 2 Change the printer to the "Envoy driver on ENV" print driver. (Select it as a printer from the "Printer Setup" option.)
- 3 "Print" the document from the program used to make the document.

Printing the document automatically opens it in the Envoy Viewer. From here, you can add "notes", or "annotations" to the document. These annotations can be highlighted text, sticky notes, hypertext links between two parts of the document, or bookmarks. (A bookmark will let you go to the marked place in the document from a drop down bookmark list.) The original document cannot be changed in the Envoy Viewer.

Also, the Envoy Viewer can be started on its own. A file previously saved from the Envoy Viewer can be loaded into it.

To make this annotated document into a document that can open itself on another

computer, the following needs to be done:

- 1 The document must be opened in the "Envoy Viewer" program.
- 2 Choose SAVE AS from the file menu.
- 3 Select the ENVOY RUNTIME FORMAT from the FILE TYPE list.
- 4 Name the file. (The file must end with .exe)
- 5 Click OK.

The file is then saved as a self-executing file. It can be "run" on another computer that does not have the file that made the original document, or even the Envoy program. When the self-executing file is run, the document opens and looks the same as it did when saved from the original Envoy program. The original document can be viewed, and "annotations" can be made as noted above (highlighted text, bookmarks, sticky notes, hypertext). Envoy help files are present, which tell how to do these things. The document can be printed or the document and its added notations can also be saved to a disk. However, the document itself cannot be changed.

As the document was saved in the self-extracting form, it apparently was compressed. The ENVOY saved version of the WYSIWYG program was

TECHNICAL BITS AND SUCH

"Ask The Experts"

Q: Recently I heard about updating a bios for plug-and-play, for Windows 95. How can someone change a computer's BIOS? Also, what is a "FLASH BIOS"?

A: The BIOS (Basic Input Output System) is the part of the computer operating system that handles the communication between the computer and its peripherals. This is usually burned into Read-Only Memory Chips on the motherboard.

There are basically two ways to change the BIOS. The easy way is if you have a Flash BIOS. Flash BIOS is a type of EEPROM (Electrically Erasable Programmable Read Only Memory) chip. It can be erased and reprogrammed directly in a system without any special devices. This enables a BIOS manufacturer to send out ROM upgrades on disk. Contact the

manufacturer for an upgrade. The manufacturer can be determined at boot-up. One of the first messages to be displayed will list the BIOS vendor. For example "AMIBIOS American Megatrends Inc." is displayed by my computer. If your BIOS is Plug-N-Play, the BIOS message will usually have PnP in front.

As you've probably guessed, if your BIOS is not a Flash BIOS, upgrading it will be a difficult job which involves physically removing and replacing it. Unless you're comfortable working with the internal hardware of your computer, I recommend you hire a professional to do this. If you feel you're up to the task, you need to contact the

WYSIWYG - What You See Is What You Get (Means the image gets printed the same as it is displayed.)

WordPerfect ENVOY Review

This is a review of WordPerfect ENVOY, a document review tool that does not require the software that the document was prepared in. This is a Windows only program, and does not work in DOS.

Today, you can save a document you made with your computer on a disk, and give it to someone else to view. They can view it on their computer if they have a copy of the program that made the document. Some programs, primarily word processing, will recognize documents made on other programs.

The purpose of WordPerfect's ENVOY program is to provide a means to view a document, print the document on paper, or make "electronic notes" to the document. The document copy with the electronic notes can then be returned to the originator. All of this can be done without having a copy of the original program that made the original document, or even a copy of the Envoy program on the "editing computer".

I originally had some problems installing the ENVOY program on my

computer. I kept getting an error message, saying that there was a conflict at a particular address location. I called the Novell technical service number. From the error message address, they asked if I was running a copy of an Adobe type manager program. Since I was, the solution was to uninstall the Adobe program. This was done, and the ENVOY program then installed correctly.

The installation program set up another printer driver on my computer, called "Envoy driver on EVY". The new driver showed up on the list with all the other printer options possible to use on all my programs.

To use Envoy, you first need to create a document in another application. This can be any kind of program, such as a word processor, a spreadsheet, a desktop publishing program, or a graphics program. The program only needs to be able to produce a printable document. I did most of my test work with Microsoft Publisher, using old

from one point to another. I also saw some stuff related to longitudes and latitudes. This is a very nice feature.

There is huge database of parks and attractions. Microsoft worked with the national park service to update and expand the database from previous versions. Microsoft claims that every state park is included in this product. I was impressed that Dodge Park here in Sterling Heights was included. Microsoft also includes ski resorts.

This product is not only for long trips. Day trips to cities in the state or from locations you fly to can be planned as well. You can explore different parts of the country to determine where you might want to travel in the future.

What bothered me about this product? I never travel for the same length of time each day, nor do I leave at the same time each morning during multi-day trips. Automap assumes that you leave the same time each morning and will drive for the same amount of time each day. This made the timing estimates for arrival inaccurate. The maps take forever to print and did cause my printer to trigger an "overflow" error which means I had to reduce the amount of

detail printed. This was particularly annoying. I have had this problem from time to time under Windows 95 with graphical packages. I like "tool tips" (helpful hints on toolbar buttons) to display when I bring the mouse over a button. Instead this product displays this "help" on the status bar at the bottom. This makes me look at two locations on the screen for some basic help information. Automap is a pretty graphic intensive program and I found the map refresh a little slow at times on my 486-66.

Will this product put companies like AAA out of business? No way! Is this product worth approximately \$39.99? Yes. It was fairly helpful in my general planning and allowed me to make some estimates on how long it would take me to get to the destinations. I still called AAA and got the maps and TripTik because they include construction information and police speed zone areas. I am also a guy with the guy gene that makes sure that I never get lost or have to ask for directions <g>. This product is perfect for those that want to have a complete atlas of the




Power User SIG

up. From what I can see the product has many more features and contains much more information than I can recall from his presentation.

Miscellaneous positives about this product include complete on-line documentation (no manuals) which is a personal preference, more than 1,100 multimedia pictures of some sites to see while traveling (CD-ROM version only), accurate gas consumption calculations, and zooming in and out with the map. The map is fairly detailed and you can determine the amount of information displayed on the map. This is a major advantage over a paper based atlas. Automap is configurable between miles/kilometers and gallons/liters

which makes it useful in the US and Canada.

The Route Wizard is very helpful. It asks you several important questions that guide you through the trip planning process. The rest stops are particularly helpful with three kids always

needing a stop. You can select preference like interstate vs. divided highways, if you like ferry rides or change roads, and how fast you travel on different types of roads. You can tell Automap to avoid a particular region as well. For instance, if you did not want to go near mountains on your trip you could highlight the area and avoid it. All journeys you define can be saved to be modified later or printed later.

I really like the measuring tool which allows you to click on two points and Automap displays the distance. You can also keep clicking on other locations and get a continual summation of the miles. It also gives you the degrees in direction you would travel

Microsoft Automap Review

The Internet recently which is what Cyberjack is all about. Here is your chance to see a tool that will help you surf the web. Hanging five at 28.8 until next month! The timing could not have been more perfect, a review copy of Automap was shipped just as I was preparing to plan my trip to Florida in late March. Since I did not get my maps from AAA at the time I decided to give this product a test whirl. I had mixed results. This review will highlight some of the capabilities, some of the features and my personal likes and dislikes.

The basic concept of this product is to plan driving trips within the United States, Canada, and northern Mexico. I loved atlases as a child and studied them for hours. I also love maps and globes. Automap allows you to completely plan a driving trip from point A to point B. It can print maps and general information you will need like gas stops, overnight stops, state, county and city information, airports, attractions, land features, parks, rest areas, and water features. It will estimate how long it will take to travel and

recommend where to stop for gas and rest. Automap will also estimate the gas consumption and costs which is very handy when budgeting your vacation or business trip. Up front specifications: Windows 3.1, Windows 95 or Windows NT

MB hard disk space (6 MB if diskette version)

Audio board w/speakers recommended

I recommend the CD-ROM version to save space on your hard drive and have access to 1,100 high quality images and the terrain maps. It is available on 3.5 inch diskettes.

This is the first version of Automap Road Atlas 4.0 for Windows under the Microsoft umbrella. How can the first version be v4.0? For those familiar with the previous versions of Automap, Microsoft purchased this product from NextBase Ltd. This is a product I have wanted to try since Tom Grish demonstrated the MS-DOS version a couple of years ago at our club's meeting, but I never got around to picking it
