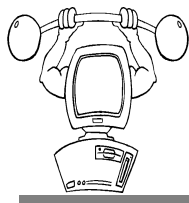

Net/Com SIG

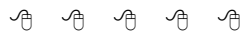


The next meeting of the Internet/Communications (Net/Comm.) SIG is Monday, December 13, 1999, starting at 7:00PM, at the

Q: I have a cable modem, set up for 1 computer. Is there a way to use this computer as a server, and allow other computers to access the Internet through this “server” simultaneously? Also, can I still use this “server” as a regular computer?

A: Yes, you can. In fact, this is exactly the set-up I use at home.

The easiest way of doing this is to purchase a copy of SyGate software. It is about \$35 for a 3user license and is VERY easy to install and use. There are other packages and I believe that the latest version of Windows 98 has this capability built-in. I haven’t found anything easier to use than SyGate. It allows all the users (up to the number licensed) to access the Internet at the same time. It runs as a background task, so it doesn’t interfere with the normal use of your server.

If you do not yet have a home network, you will need to install the appropriate hardware (Network Interface Cards (NICs), and a hub, and drivers to allow this all to work. Many locations offer a “Network in a Box” kit that gives you 2 NICs and a small hub, and all the wiring and drivers you need to network two computers. Additional computers each require their own NIC, and if you have more than 4 computers you may need a larger hub.

Once your network is installed and running (this will enable your Network Neighborhood), you can install SyGate. I believe that SyGate is only

available on the Web, at www.sygate.com. It comes with a 100 Mb limit before you have to register which is a little restrictive. Once you register, there is no limit.

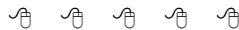
When I installed my network, all it did was “turn on” the Network Neighborhood so that I could “see” the other computers on my network. It did not “undo” my Internet connection, just added another connection.

You can easily mix and match operating systems. I currently have Windows 95, 98 and NT, and occasionally I throw in a UNIX machine.

I set up my network with an ADSL modem. It’s about 4 times faster than a cable modem and a little more secure.

derstand that ecommerce is growing much faster than local stores can grow since the population of people around the world is larger than people within driving distance of local stores. It is easier and consumes less time to purchase items online and have them delivered. On the other hand there are purchases I like to have my hands on when I plop down the credit card. It is nice to talk to experienced sales people to get the pros and cons of products and hear about other users evaluations.

I like having local computer stores so I can go in and try the products out, or get a feeling which models are better than others. Over the years I have spread my purchases to many of the local stores including CompUSA. I naturally have my personal preferences and have had positive and negative experiences at many of the popular stores. The prices have been comparable to online prices as well since I do not pay for shipping.

Lately I have started seeing signs on the wall behind the cash register that lays out the policy for returns. More and more computer stores are displaying percentages of the purchase price to "restock" the products returned. Now I am sure there is a cost to pay an employee to check out the returned item, shrink wrap it, and place it back on the shelf. But this is usually part of the business model when profits are calculated when prices are set. This has gone on for years. Even if the cost is needed to cover a competitive market of computer retail products where profits margins are slim, why a percentage? Does it take any more time to "restock" a \$500 monitor than it does to handle a package of 100 unopened CD-Rs? Not \$80 bucks worth of time. Why 20% at some stores?

Okay, I'm informed of the policies. Is this reason to rant? Maybe not. So listen to my story about CompUSA (*one* of my *former* favorite computer stores) in Madison Heights. I recently purchased an APC Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS) for my parents. I did this during a busy time at work when my time was at a premium. I did some research and found the model I wanted. CompUSA had the model and I made the purchase. The box was sealed and looked okay. I took the UPS to my parent's house and went to install it. I opened the box and found the internal box already opened. Upon further inspection I found that the UPS had a bent plug, scratches on the case, and paint on the cord. IT WAS USED!!

So I take it back to the store. I wanted to return it. Guess what? A "restocking fee" under some other marketing name which would have been over \$20. So I reluctantly went back to get the same model in a different box. You guessed it, no more in stock so I had to get the next model up. I was pretty hot since it was another \$30. I asked for a discount since I was inconvenienced by their inept restocking

crew and duped into taking back a used product. The customer service rep refused to believe that the product was returned to them and that APC shipped them the product as is. Right! APC has the best reputation in the UPS business and they ship used products to retail outlets.

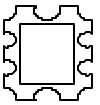
I asked for the manager. He was less helpful and took the same stand as the customer service rep. I mentioned that I recommend products all the time and even recommend the stores in which I would buy these products. I mentioned the power of the Internet and the power of publishing open letters in this venue. He encouraged me to write a letter to corporate with my issues, thus I am writing this letter in a fashion that might get your attention. I am writing it so millions of people can see how CompUSA treats customers. Your manager at the Madison Heights, MI store did not care that I help run a local user group and was willing to share my story with the membership. He did not care that I have friends on public forums and was going to make sure each one was aware of these policies and treatment. All this over \$20 bucks.

This shortsighted behavior and decision making is going to stop many \$20 bills from leaving my pocket and contributing to the profits of your company. It is not only mine, but the \$20 bills of all my customers and those from the others that read this letter via user group newsletters around the USA and on the web and see the pain they can be caused by doing business with CompUSA. Sad.

Thanks for listening to my angry story and I hope that your staff learns from this experience. I know I have.

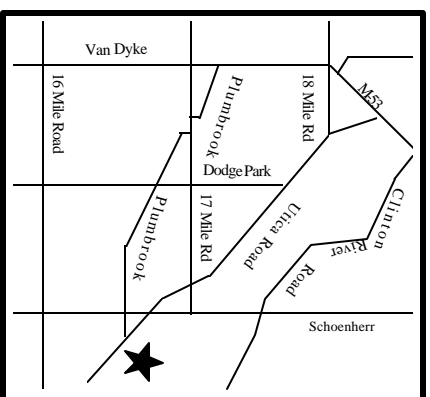
