The President's Pen

Welcome back. I hope everyone had a great summer. Mine was good, just too short.

There have been quite a few things going on in the world of computing. There's been the lawsuit against Microsoft which hasn't been settled yet and will probably drag on for quite a while. Then there's the lawsuit against Napster. It's anyone's guess where that will wind up. Then of course we now have on-line casinos where anyone with your charge card number can lose money until the card is max'ed out.

On the more positive side, access to the Internet is getting faster and cheaper. The number of features, and the amount of data available on the Internet is expanding by leaps and bounds. One of the hot offerings is the free phone sites that have popped up. You connect to the site and can call any phone in the continental United States at no charge. Many people are moving to cable access and DSL (digital subscriber line) as the price comes down.

In the operating systems area, Windows 2000 has been released for the corporate desktop and Millennium has just been release in the home arena. Windows 2000 seems to be doing OK. Hopefully Millennium will do at least

as well. On a different note, Linux is going great guns. More and more software vendors are porting their product to it, and more hardware manufacturers are offering Linux as an option. I am about to install it on an old Pentium I have, to try it out. There are six or eight SHCC members interested in Linux, and this fall we'll see if we can't get something going in the way of a SIG.

I just bought (or so it seems) a 550 Mhz Athlon machine and now a friend has gotten a 1000 Mhz (1 gigahertz) machine. The hardware that is available today is absolutely fantastic. My first machine was a 2 Mhz 6502 machine with 48 kilobytes of memory and two 8" disk drives, with no hard disk. That's a 500 times CPU increase, a 2700+ times memory increase, and a 38,000+ increase in disk storage. Then there's the increase in communications speed from a 300 Hz acoustically coupled modem (you put the phone handset into rubber cups on the top of the modem) to even a 56 KHz modem is a factor of 186. DSL and cable access are even faster.

On to SHCC stuff. The new fall line up is great. Gateway Computers will be presenting in September. Gateway will be doing one of their clinics.

Net/Com SIG



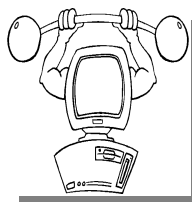

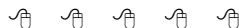

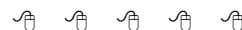
Directions To The Macomb Library

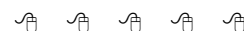
Attend A SIG

"Ask The Experts"

Q: I am considering upgrading to a faster computer, and am confused about the effects of processor speed. Is there much discernible difference, from a practical point of view, between a 700 MHz computer and a 1 GHz computer? Don't other things in a computer design also affect the actual "speed" of a computer?

A: Well, everything else being equal, the 1GHz computer should be about 1.5 times faster than the 700 MHz computer and cost about 3 times as much. Of course, everything else is never equal. Usually higher end machines will have larger and faster hard drives, better and faster graphics, and more memory. Is the larger machine worth it? Maybe. Let me list some benefits of each:

1 GHz:

- * It is faster
- * Will take slightly longer to become obsolete
- * Bragging rights

700 MHz:

- * Cheaper
- * Still pretty fast

Frankly, I'd never recommend the newest of any hardware (or software for that matter). Let someone else find all the bugs. What I would probably recommend is buy the cheaper machine and spend the extra \$\$ on memory, a nice printer, or software. Let's face it, there are very few things you can do on a 1GHz machine that you can't do on a

700 MHz machine. Also, you're less likely to have problems with the 700 MHz machine as they have been on the market longer.

Of course, there are those who MUST have the latest and greatest. To them I say "Go for it!" There's nothing nicer than having the best there is. (When it works)

Jack's Place

Hello Everyone. I trust everyone has had a great summer. It was a nice refreshing summer. I almost felt like I was living in Seattle.

My topic for this month's issue of the WYSIWYG is how to print parts of a document or website. Also included is how to save pictures and music from a website for your own personal use. Many times people come up to me showing pages of printouts when the only thing they wanted to print was a section of the document or web page.

The easiest way to do this is not to use the print button at the top of your browser, but to use the right click method of printing. Lets say you want to print out one paragraph of your document. Highlight the paragraph by doing a left click at the start of the paragraph, and dragging your mouse to the final period in the paragraph. This portion of the document would now be highlighted, usually in blue. Do a right click on the highlighted paragraph and one of your choices will be print. Then do a left click on the word *print*. You will then get a dialog box that has several choices, including *all*, *page*, and *selection*. By clicking on the *selection* button, you will only print the selection you have highlighted. Then click on *OK* and your selection should print nicely to your printer. If you have a color printer and would rather speed up your print, you can click on *properties* on the same dialog box and go to *color* and change to *gray-scale* print. This will make your printer print any selections in color and turn it into grayscale, which is a great way to save some ink.

In order to save pictures and music, you must first have a location in which you want to save them. First click on

your "*My documents*" icon on your desktop. Once this appears, click on *File* then on *New*, then on *Folder* and create a folder called *My pictures*, and then do the same thing, but this time create one called *my Music*. This way you will be able to find your pictures and sounds once they are saved. When you see a picture that you like on the web, do a right click on the picture. One of the choices that appears is *save picture as*. Click on this choice and you will notice that the default location will be something like *Desktop* in the box at the top. Click on the up arrow next to it a few times until you see *my documents* in the white square. Double click on *my documents* and you will see *my pictures* or *my music*. Click on the *my pictures* box and a blank box will

appear. Save the picture in the format that the program suggests, for example if the choice says *swissalps* in the name and *jpg* as file type, type in *swissalps.jpg* and save the picture. Now when you want to use this picture, go back to your "*My Documents*" folder, then "*My Pictures*" folder, and you will see your file.

In the case of music, do a right click on the music bar and one choice will appear called *saved target as*. In this case go to "*My Documents*" and then to "*My Music*" and save the music file in that folder. Again make sure not to change the type of file. For example if the file is a *Midi* and you save it as a *Wav*, the file may not work. If you want to change file types you will have to use a conversion program such as *Winamp*.

Viruses and the PC Mike Debacle

Sickos that create email viruses should be taken to the nearest jail and left to rot. It has been a couple of months since the lovely ILOVEYOU virus and the different strains, but I need to address one bit of fallout from this tragedy.

I guess I was in the minority of the world and was fortunate enough to have avoided this aggravation/pain. I guess I keep the right friends, or nobody cares to have my email address in their address book <g>.

This virus was cruel. Initial reports mentioned some MP3 and PG files being erased. This could be a killer for all those who have downloaded hundreds of music files. But the brutality of this virus was much deeper. It corrupted SCT files which are script files for the Windows OS, and worse, form memo files (source code for screens) for Visual FoxPro developers. One such developer in my office contracted it and we had to reformat his computer, it was that deep. I heard from several people that did the same thing. Hours and hours of lost time. This is why the losers that write these little evil programs should be locked up for a very long time.

There are other losers as well. Mike Wendland, of PC Mike fame, hosts a weekend show on a local talk radio station (WXYT), and is a technology

reporter on news radio (WWJ) here in Detroit.

He lead his listeners down the severe path on solving the email virus problem. He compromised common sense and took the hype road to get some ratings. Unfortunately he falls into the stereotypical broadcast journalism role of hype before common sense. Mike told PC users to remove/disable the Windows Scripting Host from their PC. That was *the* fix to solve the terrible loophole in Outlook. He also said that everyone should do this, regardless of whether they used Outlook or not. He noted this on his radio show and on his web site. Granted, this will work, but so will the better advice to never open a file that is attached to a email message. He only mentions this in passing later, and only on his website.

He feels that the Windows Scripting Host should be removed from the Windows Operating System. Nowhere did he mention the side effects of disabling Windows Scripting Host. As a software developer, I have used this built-in native tool to Windows for my customers, and effectively he was telling them to break my applications without informing them of the ramifications. Purely irresponsible! For some reason, likely his visibility on the radio and news media, people take his word as gospel. This is a big responsibility, and I think he stepped over the line once again. This is not the first time I have had to convince people that PC Mike's advice is totally wrong,

flawed, or out of line. While we are at it, maybe we should ban BAT files for all the world's DOS/Windows users. It just so happens that DOS is on all PCs and a BAT file could be more destructive than the brutal love bug. Same technique using DELTREE or FORMAT command in a BAT, and people are in a world of hurt.

I emailed PC Mike my feelings on this subject, and a few questions. As they say in the news business, he did not return our inquires. He has refused to have me on his radio program in the past when I wanted to correct a number of big errors he has spoken. Why is he so afraid of getting correct information to his listeners?

Two lessons to be learned from this commentary...

The first is to never, never, never open any attachment to your email. Even from a trusted source. As the ILOVEYOU and Melissa viruses have proven, they can come from people you likely know.

The second lesson to learn, do your homework. Ask the advice of several so-called gurus. Research and read on every topic. Get both sides of the story. In this case, the so-called guru is not a guru at all.

The Napster Conundrum

I'm writing while listening to Dave Brubeck. Not unusual but this is one of Brubeck's long out of production cuts, a song I've been searching for on CD for a couple of years. You guessed it. I found it on Napster. It was free.

Another? "High Wire," a just released cut from a Rob Brown and Sunny Wilkinson CD that wasn't available at cdrom.com or Barnes and Noble, my usual haunts. Right. It was already on Napster.

Napster works by connecting you to other people wanting to download MP3 music. Once connected, you search on, say, "Brubeck" and Napster's servers find everyone logged on with music that has "Brubeck" in the listing. You can limit the search to a reasonable number of hits—100 is the default—or ask for 900 (and sometime you get your wish, filling the screen with songs). Once the search is complete, a click on the title starts a download. Click on the sender's name and he or she is added to your Hot List, providing a way of finding them in subsequent sessions.

So yes, I'm using Napster, feeling conflict and guilt, and collecting songs. I logged on last month and it wasn't for research or a future article. I just had to see it for myself. Free music, all you can download, all perfectly anonymous. And entirely illegal.

Gimmie Some More

The problem is just that. The music is free, as much of it as I want, and stunningly easy to get. With a high-speed connection, I can pop a 5MB song onto my PC in less than 30 seconds. It takes me that long to turn on the amp and CD-ROM player on my home audio system. In about seven minutes I can download and start listening to the equivalent of an entire long playing record, about 55MBs. And it's ever so tempting to dip in and grab another few songs.

Scour Your i-drive for Gnutella

Want more? While less valuable than Napster, there's Scour.com, an Internet app that supplies music, videos, and images. Scour works with i-drive.com, a site that supplies users unlimited—and free—online storage space.

The story is that things get even more outrageous with Gnutella, a free program that provides anything you want. Search on Word and you'll get the program. Music? Easy. Porno? No sweat. But that's nonsense so let's dispense with Gnutella right away. First, Gnutella is more difficult to use than Napster or Scour.

Once you master Gnutella and start searching for items, you'll find more junk and x-rated sites than you can possibly imagine. For example, a search on Wordstar (stop laughing) brought up wordstar.html, a file with an xrated URL embedded inside. Same thing happened with a search for most popular programs. In a way it's a lot like unmoderated newsgroups with unfiltered files and messages.

Worse, Gnutella is probably the easiest way to pick up a virus or have your system examined by an experienced hacker. You can safely get a taste of what Gnutella's capable of by searching at CapnBry's site. <http://capnbry.dyndns.org/gnutella/gs.php>

The Napster Connection

On the other hand, Napster's files are 100 percent MP3s with no worries about viruses. The program's commercial enough with a relatively easy interface so you'll get the knack in a few minutes. If you use a personal firewall—I'm using ZoneLabs free Zone Alert (zonelabs.com) and feeling comfortable with it—you'll be safe against intruders.

Of course, there are a few downsides to Napster. Not all the music is complete, and not all of it is good quality. Some Napster users are conscientious and make it clear in the song's title that the song was cut short. Often a cut doesn't get ripped—transferred from the CD to the hard drive—properly and the music is distorted.

When you log on to Napster, you fill in your connection speed. Unfortunately, not everyone tells the truth. So you might find yourself downloading from someone using a 56k modem, making your high-speed access valueless. Or if you've decided to share one of your folders filled with music, slow connectors may start grabbing songs and you might feel guilty disconnecting them before they get anything downloaded.

Knock Knock, it's the Net Cops

In mid-June, the Recording Industry Association of America, a trade association, and a handful of record labels sued Napster, alleging it's contributing to massive copyright infringement because of its members trading songs through the service.

Nobody's going to catch you, so don't worry.

The biggest bugaboo you'll face is ethical. My concern is for the songwriter

and performer, the two groups who are generally stuck holding the unsavory end of the stick. So not only do they get screwed by the record producers, now the customer gets a chance to chisel them out of their royalties.

The Process of Denial

Some people I've talked with justify using Napster thinking it will force the record industry to pay attention and change their greedy ways. Maybe it will. I know I'd gladly pay a buck or two for each cut I want, provided I'm not stuck with the entire CD.

What I want is the ability, as with Napster, to check out and listen to the entire song, not a 15 second sample. For instance, I heard about four minutes of "The Time of the Barracudas," a Gil Evans and Miles Davis cut on the radio. I liked what I heard. After I downloaded the entire song on Napster, I realized it wasn't something I wanted to listen to again. I deleted it, just as I would with shareware I couldn't use. Had I purchased the \$16 CD, I would've been stuck with it.

And what's the business plan for the 19 year old behind Napster? The program's free and there's no advertising on Napster—no banner ads, no cookies, and no intrusions on our privacy. My guess? The kid's going to sell it to one of the big record companies.

So the question we're faced with is whether Napster is a rogue, a way to let everyone pirate music from the Internet. Or is Napster a change agent, pushing the industry towards reform?

Me? I've gotta go. There are a couple of Herbie Hancock cuts I'm trying to find.

Sidebar: HERE'S HOW: NAPSTER

Limiting uploads: Maintain control of who's able to take files from your shared music directory. One way is to limit the number of downloads to one song per person.

Check your sharing folder: It's critical you pay attention to the folder you're sharing with other Napster users. It's easy to inadvertently check the box to share the entire drive.

Security Tip: When you first begin using Napster, don't share any songs. In Napster's configuration, set the number of files to share to zero.

Don't Share at All: The safest way to use Napster is don't allow anyone to get at your files. That way you're completely safe from intruders.

Limit your Downloads: Don't try to download too many songs at once. You'll run out of bandwidth and may get knocked offline. Think about it. Your one connection will divide the bandwidth among all the songs you're downloading because each song is coming from a different user. It's better to grab a few songs. They'll download more quickly, and if you are disconnected, you'll lose only a few songs.

Dump partial songs: Get rid of incomplete partial files. Check out the file before you allow it to be copied to the next person. Better, set Napster to delete incomplete files.

Be Polite: Check if others are downloading files from your drive before you log off. Use Napster's Chat feature to warn people just starting a download if you're planning to log off.

Hotlist Tip: As you search, watch for people on the list with multiple selections of your favorite author. Put them on your Hotlist and ignore users with just one selection.

Protect Yourself: Use Zone Lab's free firewall, Zone Alert. It will stop outsiders from doing any harm. (www.zonelabs.com).

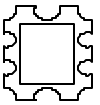

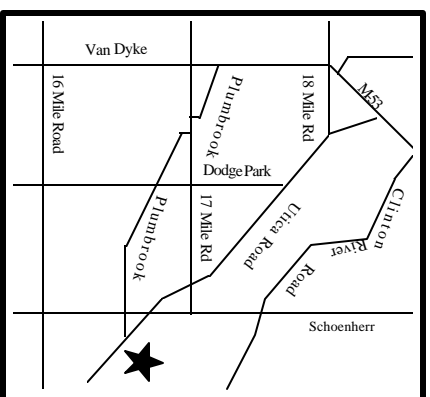
